

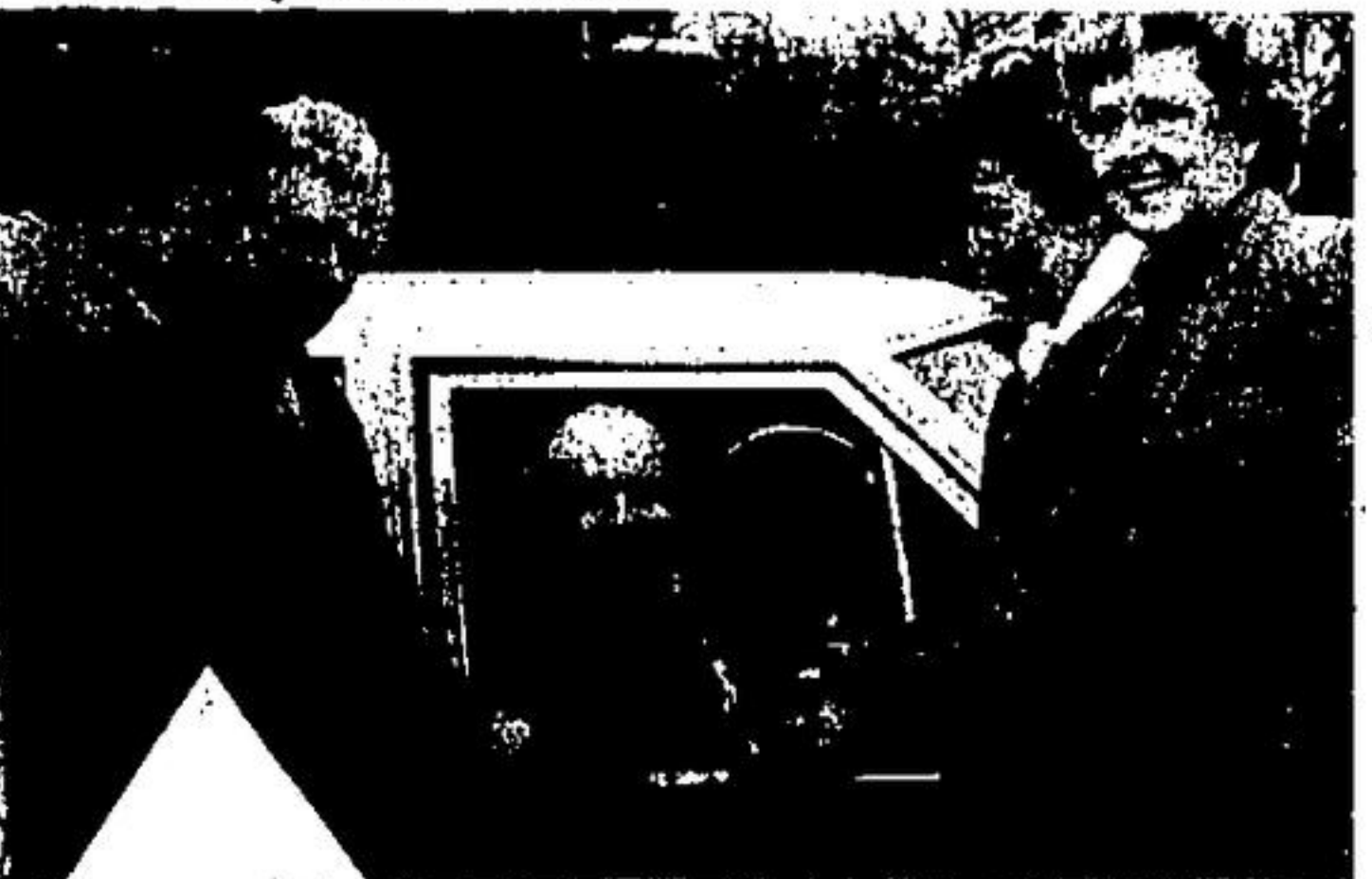
### HERALD'S PICTURE PARADE
