

A Georgetown woman was discovered lying along the banks of the Credit River by two 15-year-old children Monday at 6 p.m.

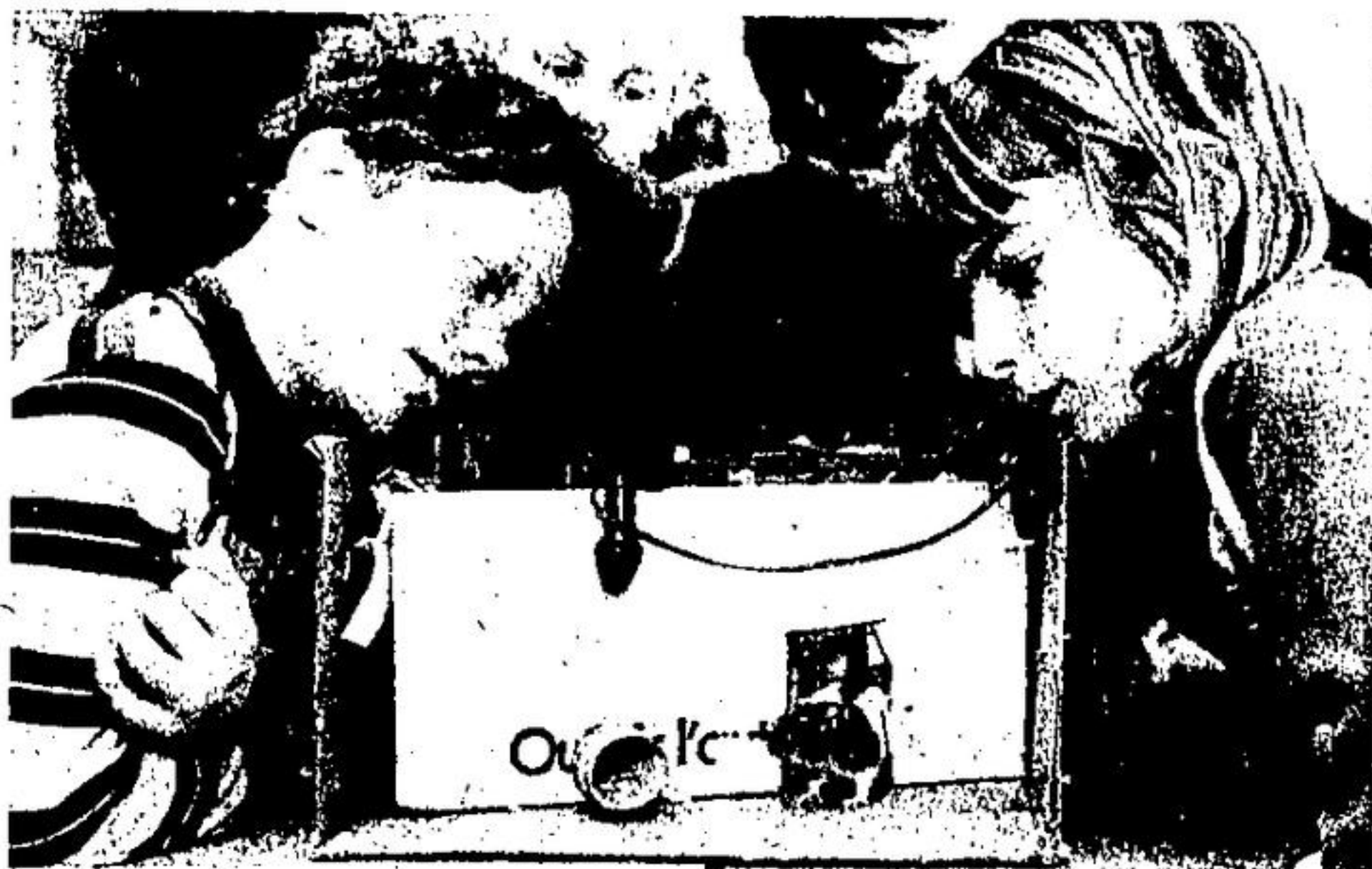
The youths were walking along the banks of the Credit at the River Drive area when they saw the woman half in the river in an unconscious state.

Constable Susan Zohar was called to the scene and administered artificial respiration to the victim until ambulance attendants arrived.

Marina Pacheco, 22, of Georgetown, was rushed to the intensive care unit at Georgetown District Memorial Hospital and is now listed in "satisfactory" condition.

Halton regional police believe the woman entered the water at that location and are carrying out an investigation.

Region studies costing more each year

Nearly \$1 million was spent on studies by the region's business development, finance, planning, public works departments and the Chief Administrative Office last year.

Thanks to government grants, the region only spent \$918,988 of the total \$1,021,438 bill it ran up.

This amount is the most ever spent by the region for studies, despite efforts to do many studies in-house, with

regional staff. According to a summary of what the region has spent on studies since 1976, studies are costing more and more each year. In fact, last year's bill was a big jump over the net bill paid by the region for studies in 1983.

In 1983, the region paid \$574,820 for studies. Back in 1981, the region forked out \$140,860 for the same number of studies, five.

The summary shows the region's been spending substantially more for studies since 1981. A sum total of all the monies spent on studies by the region since 1976 tallies to \$3.5 million. The majority of the studies have been for the public works department, 61 per cent. During that nine year period, a total of 175 studies were undertaken. The public works department had 107 studies of that total.
