Hockey changes

There are three schedule changes to the Georgetown Minor Hockey Association (GMHA) tryouts this week. The Minor Midget "AA" tryouts will be Saturday from 12-1 p.m., and Tuesday from 9-10:30 p.m.

Raider MVP

Mistakes made this season won't happen next year, Georgetown Chrysler Raiders president Finn Poulstrup said at the team's year-end party Friday night.

"I firmly believe the best team this year in the Ontario Senior "A" Hockey League was eliminated in the first round," Poulstrup said. "We were plagued by injuries and overestimated the commitment of some of the players."

"Our mistakes won't be repeated this year." The Raiders finished fourth overall in the league standings, and faced Petrolia Squires in the first round of the playoffs. The series went the full distance as Petrolia defeated Georgetown in the seventh and deciding game to advance on to meet Flamboro.

After talking on the season gone by, Poulstrup thanked the team executive for their work and commitment to the hockey club this past year. Then the club awards were handed out.

Dave Hill won the Georgetown Chrysler award as the Most Improved Player. Defenceman Peter Sturgeon was named the Most Valuable Player, but the most memorable aspect of the presentation was when Raider past-president and treasurer Bob Hooper went to present the trophy. The trophy broke, and a loud crash was heard throughout the Georgetown Legion Hall as the awards presentations went on.

Team captain Ray Tonelli was presented the Joe Hall Memorial award, which was initiated this year, and will be given annually to the Raider captain in the 1950s. Tonelli also accepted the Player of the Year award for Tim Ampleford, who was not present. Ampleford accumulated more star-of-the-game points than any other Raider during the season.

Poulstrup presented the President's award to four executive members for their work this year. Ron Faulkner, Don Olsen, Al Walker and Steve Gemesi were presented the trophies.

Finally, Olsen was named the winner of the Jack Harrison award given annually to the person making an outstanding contribution to Raider Hockey.

Start of golf sign summer here to stay

Although summer does not officially begin for a few weeks yet, a sure sign of the warmer months is the advent of the golf season. Area courses are open now, or will be open this week, with the greens being in good shape.

The Herald contacted five area courses, and talked with managers or club pros about the fees and other topics of interest.

GEORGETOWN GOLF AND COUNTRY CLUB
The club opened for business Friday, with green fees being \$12 for 18 holes and \$8 for nine holes during the week. Weekend prices are \$15 for 18 holes and \$12 for nine.

Clubs are also offered for rent with the price being \$6.50. Tax is included in this price.

Club memberships are being offered too. A week-day pass is offered for \$250. This allows the person to play anytime after 3 p.m. on weekdays, weekends and holidays.

A full membership for men and women is \$475 and \$275 respectively. Here patrons are allowed to play anytime they so desire. Juniors can pay \$150, which allows them to play after 3 p.m. anytime.

Club pro Dave Kemshead is also available for lessons. Club hours are 6 a.m. till dark on weekends and 7 a.m. till dark during the week. For further information call 877-6011.

HORNBY TOWERS
Hornby opened April 12, and club pro Dave Lock said the course is in good shape. He said green fees are \$12 for 18 holes during the week and \$14 on the weekends. There is no nine hole fee offered.

If you are interested in gaining a club membership, you are out of luck as all memberships have been taken. Club hours are 7 a.m. till dark, and one can call 878-3421 for more information.

ERIN GOLF AND COUNTRY CLUB
Dampness in a few spots will result in the club opening sometime this week, manager Effie Halliday said.

Green fees for the nine hole course will be \$12 for 18 holes and \$7 for nine during the week. On weekends the fees are \$12 for 18 and \$7 for nine.

Club rentals are offered, with the price being \$5. Memberships are also offered with a men's seven day package going for \$325. This

allows patrons unlimited use of the course anytime.

The women's seven day membership is \$275, and is the same as the men's. A full husband and wife package is \$475, with every additional family member under 18 being \$95. Juniors will pay \$150 for a seven day membership. (Juniors are 18 and under).

Although the course is nine holes, there are different tee settings for those wishing to play 18 holes. For further information one can call 1-519-833-9702 from 7 a.m. till dark.

ACTON MEADOWS

Manager Lorne Norton said he was hoping to have opened by the weekend. He said a couple of wet areas still exist, but that the course itself is in good shape.

Pay-as-you-play fees are \$8 for 18 holes and \$5 for nine during the week. For weekend play, the prices are \$10 for 18 and \$7 for nine on the pine hole course.

The club does offer a full membership, but only to those who had them last year. That price is \$270 for men which allows for unlimited use anytime.

A weekday membership for men will cost \$195 while being \$160 for women. A family membership is \$330, with an additional cost of \$50 for each youngster under the age of 18 wanting to join.

The junior (under 18) package is \$85 while the intermediate (over 18) membership is \$220. Club rentals are available for \$3.50. For more information call 853-0631.

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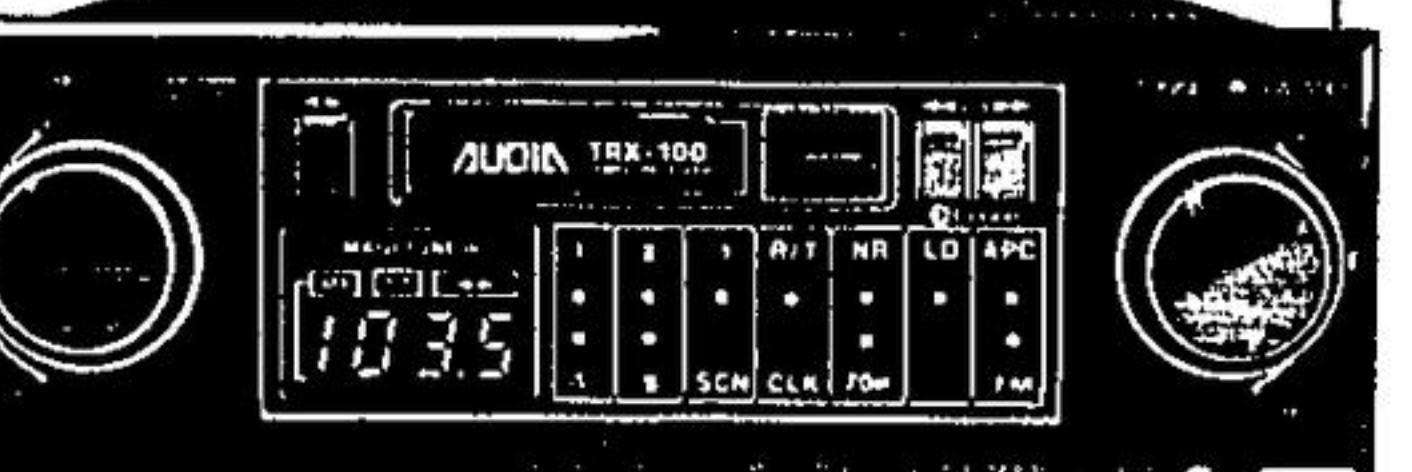
