The Herald contacted five area courses, and talked with managers or club pros about the fees and other topics of intrest.

GEORGETOWN GOLF AND COUNTRY CLUB The club opened for business Friday, with green fees being \$12 for 18 holes and \$8 for nine holes during the week. Weekend prices are \$15 for

18 holes and \$12 for nine. Clubs are also offered for rent with the price

being \$6.50. Tax is included in this price. Club memberships are being offered too. A week-day pass is offered for \$250. This allows the person to play anytime after 3 p.m. on weekdays, weekends and holidays.

A full membership for men and women is \$475 and \$275 respectively. Here patrons are allowed to play anytime they so desire. Juniors can pay \$150, which allows them to play after 3 p.m. anytime.

Club pro Dave Kemshead is also available for lessons. Club hours are 6 a.m. titl dark on weekends and 7 a.m. till dark during the weekend. For further information call 877-6011.






