Hunters given the sign

Hunters are going to have a better idea of where to tote their guns in Halton Falls.

Regional councillors have authorized the putting up of "no hunting" signs along the boundary between the agreement forest property in Milton and abutting private property of the Robertson tract.

In response to complaints from Milton Coun. Bill Johnson and area residents, councillors also asked that the Ministry of Natural Resources set up a meeting of residents, police, M.N.R. staff, regional staff, the Halton Region Conservation Authority, the Halton Agricultural Advisory Committee and gun club

representatives to work out solutions.

"Although we live a half mile from the tract, we've had to chase hunters off our land," R.A. Halet told councillors last week. "On fall and winter weekends, this is beginning to look like High Park in Toronto."

He said many hunters don't know where the fence line is between the 200 acre Robertson tract in the north central portion of Halton Falls and the conservation authority's adjacent forest.

Hunting runs from September end to February end and safety is a big concern for Coun. Johnson and neighbors to the hunting grounds.

The Town of Halton Hills intends to undertake the following two road reconstruction projects located within the Georgetown area.

CONTRACT P-85-C-2
FOURTH LINE/SEVENTEEN SIDE ROAD RECONSTRUCTION - PHASE 2
Involving the reconstruction of Seventeen Side Road from Trafalgar Road to approximately 350 meters west of the Sixth Line, including ditching, granular base and asphalt paving.

CONTRACT P-85-C-6
ARMSTRONG AVENUE STORM SEWER, ROAD REALIGNMENT AND BANK STABILIZATION PHASE 1
Involving the reconstruction of Armstrong Avenue, 30 meters east of Sinclair Avenue to approximately 240 meters west of Sinclair Avenue, including storm sewer, sanitary sewer and realignment of the existing roadway including granular base, curb and gutter, asphalt paving and the closing of Armstrong Avenue to vehicular traffic from Sinclair Avenue to a point approximately 240 meters westward, for the anticipated two month duration of construction.

Plans detailing the proposed projects will be available for viewing by the public in the Council Chambers, Municipal Administration Building, Trafalgar Road, between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 23, 1985. Representatives of the Town Engineering Department and the Consultants for the projects will be in attendance to explain the projects and address any inquiries.
