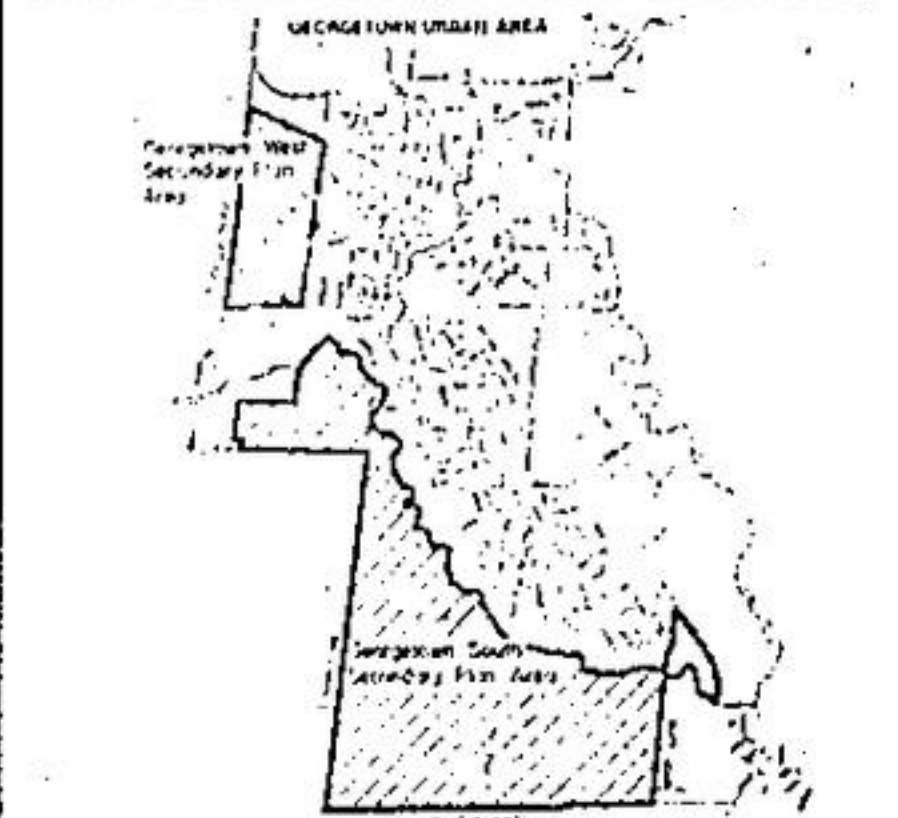

Specters win fastball opener

Glen Williams Specters have gotten off to a winning start in the Intercounty Fastball League this year.

The Specters recorded a 3-2 win over Fergus last Tuesday night at the Glen Williams diamond. Last night Glen Williams entertained Orangeville and tonight the team goes on the road for its first away game of the year as the Specters will be in Rockwood.

Glen Williams used three pitchers in their opening game, which was something manager Ted Wilkes had planned to do on purpose.

"It was the first outing and it is still early in the year," he said. "It was a little cool outside, and we don't want any sore arms."

Gary Halls pitched the first three innings before giving way to Mark Curtis. The final three innings were pitched by Moe Curtis. Halls ended

up picking up the win. The Specters fell behind 1-0 early as Fergus scored their first run in their initial inning of the contest. Glen Williams tied the contest 1-1 with a run in their half of the first inning, then scored runs in the second and third frames for a 3-1 advantage.

Fergus scored their final run of the contest in the eighth inning to round out the scoring. Wilkes said he had told his pitchers no matter

game. He said all three showed pretty good pitching form.

"I think knowing they would be in the ball game for just three innings allowed them to go out and go a little harder because they wouldn't have to worry about pacing themselves," Wilkes said. He also added that the pitchers will be eased into working more innings because it is still early in the year.

Wilkes said he expects the Intercounty league to be very competitive this year, which is healthy for both the players and fans.

"I would say good competition is important. You need it in order to be a good team," he said.

NOTES-Wilkes has not heard anything about the application he made earlier last month for the Ontario Amateur Softball Association provincial tournament. The tournament would be for the "AA" zone champions

from which an Ontario champion would be decided. Wilkes said he is hoping to hear something about the application later this month.

The Intercounty league has had one franchise fold for the year. The team from Alton has ceased operations, and the league will now consist of eight teams.

The league has also decided to increase the number of games played this year as a result of the Alton folding. Now each team will play 28 games rather than the 24 games that were scheduled before.

Specters' player Andy Broadbent will once again be the team captain.
