There will be family fitness in the parks led by instructors from Georgetown's health club Work That Body. Instructors will be holding a workout at Prospect Park in Acton from 6 - 6:30 p.m. and then at Cedarvale Park in Georgetown from 7:30 - 8 p.m.

If you're a dancer at heart, the Pine Valley Square Dancers welcome you to the Stewarttown Community Centre from 8 - 10 p.m. for some swings and twirls.

For aquatically-minded the Georgetown Indoor Pool will be open for a free water exercise time 8:45 - 9:30 p.m.

The Acton Sabres have been officially accepted into the Midwestern Junior C Hockey League.

General manager Elmer Dunn told an exccutive meeting Thursday he called the Ontario Hockey Association (OHA) office earlier in the day and was told Acton's application had been approved. The approval comes almost five weeks after Dunn had sent the application to the OHA office.

The news was somewhat of a welcome relief for the executive.

"I felt pretty confident we would get in," Dunn said after the meeting. "It makes things a little easler because we know what we have to do, and now we can do it."

"I think everything will start now," said president Ed Thomson. "It's hard to get a commitment from people in our sponsorships when you're not part of a league."

The first matter the executive took care of was voting minor hockey midget coach Steve Marshall as the club's coach. He too was glad the waiting was over. "I know the league,

was looking forward to having us go in, and I was expecting it (acceptance), but you never know for sure. It's a nice feeling knowing we can get started."

The executive then proceeded to make plans to get the ball rolling in regards to the upcoming season. Some of the subjects discussed included: -the club will likely have two assistant coaches. Marshall can select who he wants, but the executive will vote on whether to accept them or not.

The Sabres folded after Innes and Cargill took over just before the regular season began due to a lack of local players.

Now Innes has applied for entry into the Central League on behalf of the former Port Credit Titans of the Motro Junior B League. Wednesday night the Ontario Hockey Association voted to accept Innes' application, which will now be forwarded and voted upon at the Central League meeting May 29 at the OHA office.

When asked why his club is seeking entry into the Central League, Innes pointed to time and "We have kids who are going to school, and

it is hard to get up to go to school when we get in at .4 a.m. from Kingston. "That's what I liked about Acton," he said. "It was in the Central League."

Innes could see some distinct advantages to his club being in the Central League too. "Our furthest trip would be to Barrie, and
