GDHS track team place in 50 events

The Halton track and field championships Friday at Etobicoke left Georgetown coaches Karen Cosgrove and Donna Metcalfe smiling. Their Georgetown District High School track team qualified in over 50 events for the coming Peel-Halton finals.

In all of the events Georgetown athletes placed at least in the top six, Mrs. Cosgrove said. Going into the meet, the coaches were confident. "We have more depth across the board than in other years and our sprinters are really coming along," Mrs. Cosgrove said.

Sue King has been working with the field athletes and they've shown a lot of improvement, Mrs. Cosgrove said.

The coaches were surprised White Oaks, a traditional powerhouse in track, weren't stronger at the meet, held at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium.

She was impressed with the performance of Rick Fontanna who captured first place in the 200 meter finals. The senior boys haven't done well in the sprints for

years, the coach said. GDHS had the best performance of all the Halton schools from their girls and they also captured an overall team trophy for the most wins by their athletes.

In the 200 meter steeplechase David Banks did exceptionally well to place second, followed by teammate Nick Parker in third.

In the junior boys 110 meter hurdles Louis de Paoli was second with a time of 15.1 while Dan Weisz was fifth.

Jody Barwell was first in the 100 meter hurdles competing for the senior girls while teammate Connie Powers captured fifth spot.

Nancy Mustard was second in the junior girls 80 meter hurdles. In the 400 meter midget boys event Jason Toome and Joe Balsion tied for first place with a time of 56.2.

The girls did exceptionally well in the 400 meter event. Alison Irvine was fourth while Tara Burroughs was second. In the junior girls Shannon Snyder was third while Sandy Fahm was fourth. In the senior girls Kathy Harris was fourth and Karen Pepper was close behind.

In the 1500 meter event Jeff Amato placed second while Dave Paul was first. For the junior boys Andy Kiss was second while Kevin Powers was first in the senior boys.

For the girls Shawn Langdon was third for the seniors while in the junior division Amy Powers was third. Krista Snyder also captured the bronze for the midget girls 1500 meter race.

In the open girls 400m hurdles Michelle Barnard managed a fourth. Jody Barwell was the top GDHS runner in the 100 m finals for the senior girls finishing second with a time of 12.7.

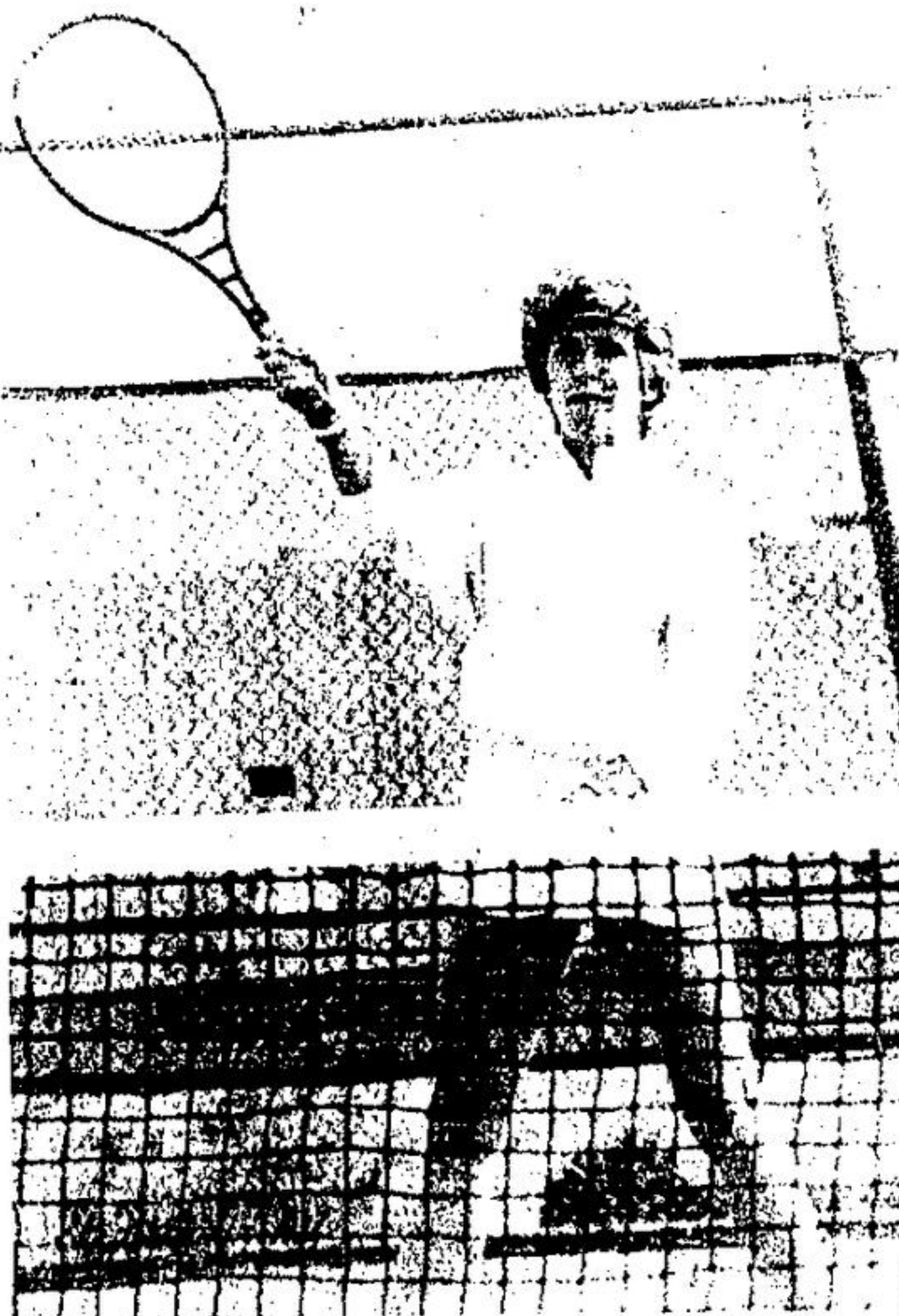
In the 800 metre event Jeff Amato collected a second for the midget boys while teammate Dave Paul was first.

Tyke Giants lose in extra innings

The Georgetown Tyke Giants major tyke baseball club played their first away game in Milton Thursday and dropped an extra inning 12-11 decision.

Trailing 10-6 going into the top of the seventh and final inning, the Giants rallied for five runs to take an 11-10 lead.

Jason Ogden led off the seventh with a walk and came around to score on consecutive singles by Ryan Schirk, Jeff Pettigrew and Mark St. Pierre, leaving the bases still loaded.

Shortstop Steven Wright then bounced back to the pitcher who threw the ball over the catcher's head trying to get the force at the plate which narrowed the score to 10-8.

One out later, David

Vanderbyl cleaned the bases with a triple into right centre field to give Georgetown a one run lead entering the bottom of the seventh.

Milton's lead-off batter hit a line shot in the gap between right and centre field. However, right fielder Todd Fuller made a beautiful running shoe string catch to prevent a sure extra base hit.

Milton eventually tied the game on two infield hits and two stolen bases to force extra innings.

In the top of the eighth Georgetown went down quietly in order while in the bottom of the inning the second Milton batter hit a one out solo shot far into the right field bleachers.

Jeff Wright went the distance on the mound for Georgetown and pitched a fine game

stinking out five and allowing only three walks.

A shaky defence in the early innings forced the Giants to play catch-up ball for the whole game.

At one point, there were two pitchers from Mississauga and Milton who might have joined the team, but Guistini is content to work within his present lineup.

Mario Galvao is the only pitcher from last year back with the team. He was a relief pitcher last season.

Thus far, the Eagles have been relying heavily on Louis Galvao, his younger brother.
