The Finance Minister thinks seniors are willing to sacrifice to see the deficit come down, but Mrs. Fisher doesn't think that's the case.

The federal government is changing personal income tax indexation in 1986 so that only inflation in excess of 3 per cent is reflected in exemptions and tax brackets. Increases in family allowance and old age pensions will be restricted under this formula.

Mrs. Fisher is also concerned about the effect of the budget on education. With transfer payments to the provinces to be cut by \$2 billion annually by the end of the decade, that could have a very large effect on the local education budget.

"It depends on where the province prioritizes its money," Mrs. Fisher

Carney opposes budget gas hike

Middling in the dictates of last week's federal budget was called a no-no and turned down by town councillors Monday night.

Coun. Phil Carney wanted the town to object to the gas price increase of two cents a liter the federal government will be instituting Sept. 3.

"Gas is a necessity, particularly in a municipality like ours," Coun. Carney said. "I don't think gas is a luxury."

Couns. Rick Bonnette and Marilyn Serjeantson were the only other two councillors supporting sending a message of complaint to Ottawa.

"Coun. Carney is completely right to say gas is a necessity today. It's no longer a luxury to drive your car," Coun. Bonnette said. "In many garages in Acton, you'll see two cars."

Coun. Serjeantson said she resented the increase in gas.

"Most of us do have it (car) because we find without a car, we're stuck. It's a way of our life," she said.

Coun. Dave Whiting said it wasn't council's place to comment on the federal budget.

"The energy accord between the province and the federal government has a great deal to do with that increase in gas price," Coun. Whiting said. "It looks like you have a lack of work, putting such a motion forward."

Coun. Ross Knechtel said there isn't anything in the Municipal Act which says a council can pass resolutions about the federal government.

At the Region

Consultants under fire

A lack of confidence in the region's consultants was expressed last week by two regional councillors.

Burlington Couns. Walter Grieve and Joan Little aired doubts in the work the region has been getting from Walker Wright Young Consultants in its search for a new regional dump.

"I have a lack of confidence in the consultants we have working for the region," Coun. Grieve said.

"I guess I suffer from a lack of confidence in the consultants too," Coun. Little echoed.

The remarks were inspired by a letter from

the town of Oakville requesting the region do more drilling on potential landfill sites D, E and F. Sites D and E are in Milton on Britannia Road and site F is in Burlington, next to the current regional dump.

The town has done its own geological investigations on site A which is in Oakville, in the area of Britannia and Trafalgar Roads.

Mayor Harry Barrett also asked that a drilling program be undertaken off-site to determine the path for water between site F and Lake Ontario, and that geomechanical tests be carried out on the ripability of the weathered bedrock shale and its suitability

as a base for the sanitary landfill site.

Councillors supported the additional work despite the extra expense.

Oakville Coun. Carol Gooding said she doesn't want another Cayuga, referring to the Ontario Waste Management Corporation's unsuccessful attempts to establish a toxic waste dump near Dunnville, Ontario.

She said she wants all the cards on the table prior to the region's site selection meeting July 24.

"We've had all kinds of committees telling us we need more information. Why are we delaying?" Oakville Coun. Peter Arch demanded.

Milton Coun. Bill Johnson chastised his fellow councillors. "Now, suddenly you're all experts. It's a bit late in the day to say you have no faith in the consultants. You should have thought about that four or five months ago," Coun. Johnson said.

A motion to hire another drilling company to do the work was blasted by Halton Hills Coun. Dave Whiting.

"I support the further drilling. It's important," Coun. Whiting said. "The drilling should be done with our consultants."
