Halton Hills Firefighters had a relatively quiet week with just three calls.

Friday night the department was called to a garbage fire at 120 Armstrong Ave. The 6:54 p.m. call resulted in no damage.

Saturday morning at 8:02 a.m. a call was made concerning an accident on Highway 7 between the fourth and fifth lines near Acton. The department was called to free a person from an automobile.

Tuesday morning at 12:20 a.m. Halton Hills Firefighters were called to a garbage fire in Acton. There was no damage at the Mill and Willow Streets location.

Fire damage doubles

Although calls were down to the Halton Hills fire department this April over last April, fire damages were more than double.

There was \$54,750 in damages caused by fires in town last month. In April 1984, fire damages tallied \$19,850.

There were 49 calls for help last month, compared with 69 last April.

Injuries were also up from zero in April 1984 to two members of the public last month.

So far this year, fires have caused \$198,755 in damages. Last year to April end, fires caused \$306,790 in damages.

Mountainview Road

could be a major access to Highway 401

Big things are in the works for Mountainview Road, also known as Ninth Line.

According to a consultant with Walker Wright Young Associates Ltd., the road which cuts through prime agricultural land between Georgetown and Steeles Avenue is to become a major transportation route in the future, with access to Highway 401.

Town planner Ian Kelth said a transportation study is to be released in early June which describes future plans for local roads.

He said Mountainview Road is to be an arterial road, with four lanes of traffic, and perhaps even six lanes.

Acton La Leche meet

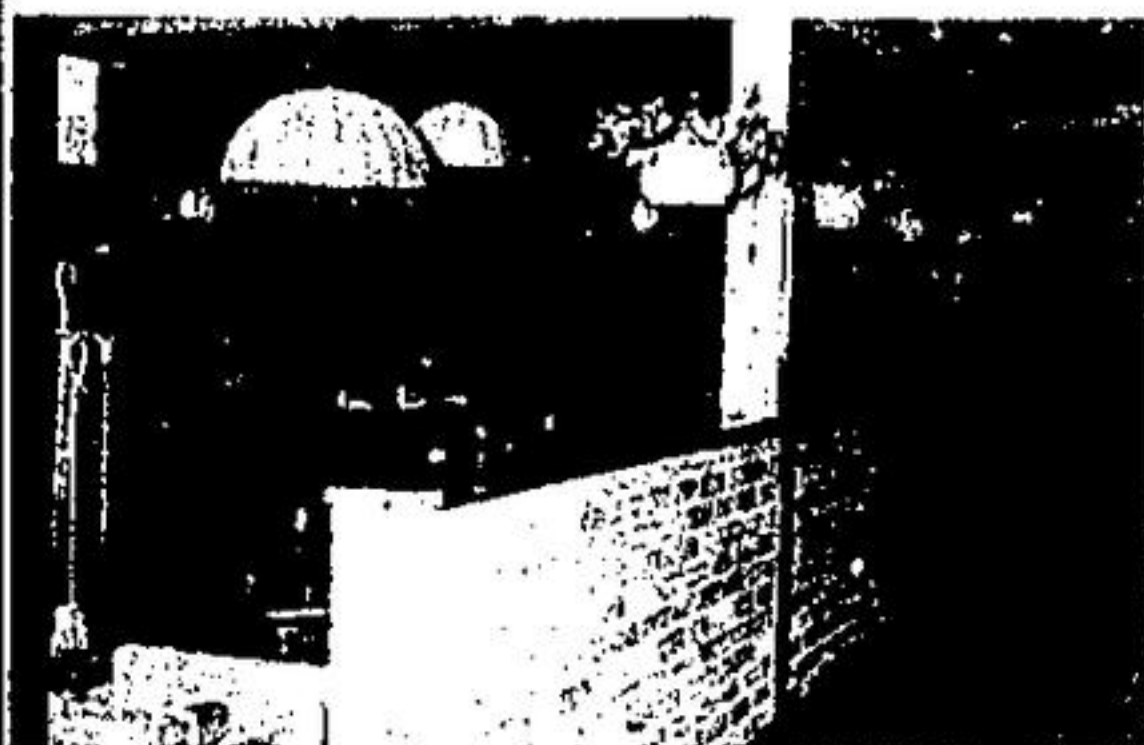
La Leche League of Acton will meet on Monday, June 10 at 8 p.m. at 74 Nelson Court for women who are interested in information about breastfeeding.

POOR MAN'S PUDDING

Batter:
1/3 cup brown sugar
1 cup flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 cup milk
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup chopped dates, raisins or prunes.

Sauce:
1 cup brown sugar
1 tbsp. butter
Pinch nutmeg
2 cups boiling water.

Mix batter, which is stiff. Put in 8" pan. Make sauce and pour over batter. Bake in 350° oven about 30 minutes, or until done. This makes its own sauce, on the bottom.
