> WHAT IS THE GREAT CANADIAN PARTICIPACTION CHALLENGE?

It's a one day, inter-city fitness contest. And it's fun. The official challenge is issued by five "host city" mayors, representing different populations across the country. The object is to motivate as many people as possible to register their participation with a local organizing committee. It means just 15 minutes of any physical activity that makes your heart beat faster - like walking, jogging, cycling or swimming. The winning community or "Fittest city" in each category is the one which achieves the highest percentage of citizen participation.

JUST IS MINUTES Nobody is going to be fit after walking or running for just 15 minutes on Challenge Day, but getting up and out represents a personal commitment to the idea of fitness. The Challenge is a step, or a skip in the right direction and may be the first of many more to come for thousands of Canadians.
