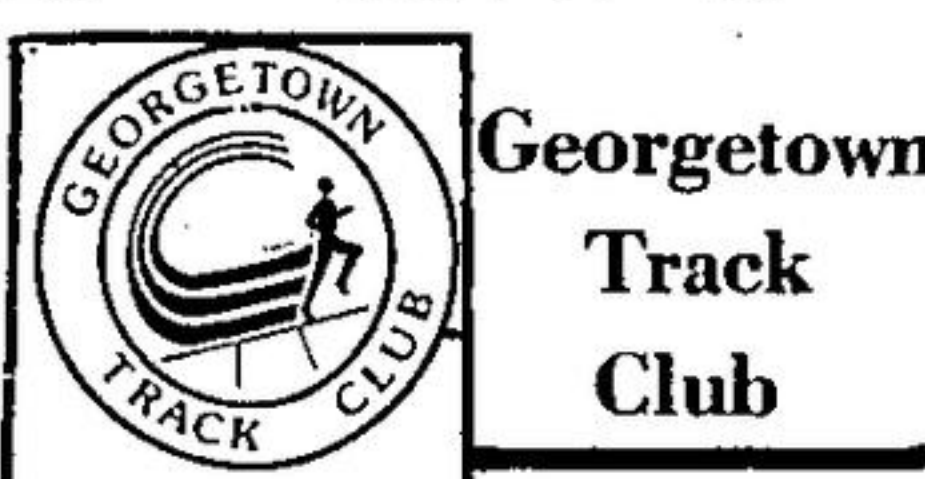

Today is the National Participation Challenge. It seems as if everyone is getting involved as Georgetown is being challenged by Fredericton, New Brunswick.

WHAT IS THE GREAT CANADIAN PARTICIPATION CHALLENGE?
 It's a one day, inter-city fitness contest. And it's fun. The official challenge is issued by five "host city" mayors, representing different populations across the country. The object is to motivate as many people as possible to register their participation with a local organizing committee. It means just 15 minutes of any physical activity that makes your heart beat faster - like walking, jogging, cycling or swimming. The winning community or "fittest city" in each category is the one which achieves the highest percentage of citizen participation.

JUST 15 MINUTES
 Nobody is going to be fit after walking or running for just 15 minutes on Challenge Day, but getting up and out represents a personal commitment to the idea of fitness. The Challenge is a step, or a skip in the right direction and may be the first of many more to come for thousands of Canadians.

Peel-Halton track and field
Rebels qualify for Regional meet

Consistency best describes Georgetown District High School's performance at Friday's Peel-Halton track and field meet.

The Rebels had athletes win two events, but had a host of others finish in the top four to

qualify for today's regional championships slated for York University.

Both top finishes came in the 3,000 meter races where midget Jeff Amato and senior Kevin Powers did the honors. Amato's finishing time

wasn't available while Powers won his race in 9:15.0.

A total of four other Rebels qualified for the regional 3,000 meters event. Junior Amy Powers (3rd), seniors Shawn Langdon (3rd) and Linda Wenham (5th)

will run in the girls' races while junior Mike Wood joins Amato and Powers as a qualifier for the boys' races. Wood finished his race in second in a time of 9:18.0. The three girls' times were not available.

The Rebels also qualified many athletes in the 1,500 meter event, where a total of seven runners will go to the regional meet. Langdon will be the lone female runner from GDHS by virtue of her fourth place finish (5:09) in the senior race. Midgets Dave Paul and Amato finished 2-3 in their race while juniors Andy Kiss and Mike Wood finished 3-4 in respective times of 4:18.4. In the senior

event Powers was second (4:06.4) while teammate Ken Hesse finished third (4:09.7).

Three Rebels finished in the top four of their category in the 400 meter race. Junior Shannon Snyder was third in her class while midgets Jason Toome and Joe Balsom were third and fourth respectively. All three will compete at the regionals.

Fourth place finishes by Jody Barwell and Rich Fontana in the senior 200 meter races mean the two will advance to today's competition. Barwell also finished second in the senior 100 meter hurdles to qualify in that event also.

also finished second in the 110 meter hurdles in a time of 15 seconds flat.

Three more Rebels advanced with their placings in the 800 meter races. Midget Alison Irvine finished fifth with a time of 2:24 while senior Kathy Harris was fourth in her race in a time of 2:31. Midget Paul was second in his race in 2:09 while senior Hesse finished second in 1:59.9.

Nancy Mustard qualified for the meet today with a fifth place finish in the open girls 400 meter hurdles.

The midgets were third in a time of 48.1 seconds as Balsom, Dave Fisher, Ray Fisher and Toome made up that team.

Also the girls 4 x 400 team of Irvine, Hahn, Snyder and Tara Burroughs finished fourth in their race.

Dave Banks' third place finish in the 2000 meter steeplechase event also qualifies him for the meet.

High jumpers Jenny Melville and Glenn McCaughy finished third and fourth in the midget girls and senior boys events respectively. No heights were available.

Junior shot putter Cathie Barton finished second in her event with a throw of 9.80 meters.

Acton High track team nets seven gold medals at meet

Acton High School captured seven gold medals and a silver at the Peel-Halton Track and Field championships.

A total of seven athletes competing in 10 events made up the Redmen squad.

Midget runner Marla Brillinger and senior Doreen Uranick both had two gold medals each in the 400 and 800 meter races. Brillinger won her

respectively. Uranick won the 400 race in 57.5 seconds, and set a new Peel-Halton record in the 800 with her time of 2:10.9.

Senior Theresa Dunn took home the gold in the discus with a throw of 31.64 meters. She won a silver in the shot put with a throw of 10.13 meters.

Midget competitors Sue Craig and Darryl

Bartlett won the other Acton gold medals. Craig was first in the long jump with an effort of 4.58 meters, while Bartlett won the 110 meter hurdles race in 14.7 seconds.

The athletes will now advance on to the regional meet being held at York University. Qualifiers here will compete in the Ontario Federation of Schools Athletic Association meet.

GMHA formally applies for bantam tournament

The Georgetown Minor Hockey Association (GMHA) has formally sent a letter of application to host the 1986 Ontario "AA" Bantam hockey championships.

GMHA president Wayne Pries said the application was made based on the success the association had in holding the "AA" midget tournament last April.

"We did it once with the midget tournament and liked it," he said.

The letter was to have been sent to the Ontario Minor Hockey Association

(OMHA) office by June 15, and a decision will be made on the site of the tournament by the end of the month. Pries said he is confident Georgetown will be selected as the host for the event.

"I am quite confident we will host it based on our record last year," he said.

The GMHA is applying for the bantam event mainly because it is the only one left that applies to what Georgetown has to offer. Pries said the only other tournament

the association could ask to hold would be the "A" midget event, but that wouldn't be applicable, because Georgetown does not have a "A" midget team.

If the GMHA does receive the bantam event, the community will have a representative in the tournament as the host is able to put a team into the provincial championship playdown. That team would be the major "AA" rep squad.

If selected to host the tournament, Pries said the tournament commit-

tee would likely go after a sponsor like the GMHA did with its midget tournament. However, he did add he is not sure if the bantam event already has a sponsor who yearly handles the costs of the weekend affair.

Should the GMHA be successful in its application, the tournament would likely be held again in April, and involve the top teams from the OMHA, Northern Ontario Hockey Association (NOHA) and Metropolitan Toronto
