Obituary

John L. McClure

John Laughlin Mc-Clure, a lifelong resident of Georgetown, passed away in St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, on April 27, 1985, after an Illness of several munths. His sickness was borne very valiantly to the day of his death. John was 63.

He was born December 3, 1921, on the family farm at Lot 17, Concession 10 in the Township of Esquesing. This farm was later incorporated in the Town of Georgetown and is now known as the Delrex Industrial Park.

He was the son of William Albert McClure and Sarah Jane Eccles and attended Chapel Street Public School, and later the old Georgetown High School, where he participated on the school rugby team.

Leaving school at an early age he assisted his family in the operation of their dairy farm.

In 1955, Mr. McClure and his brother purchased their present farm on the 10th Line of Esquesing and he continued to farm there until his Illness. He was the greatgrandson of James Eccles, the first owner of this land, a pioneer who arrived there from Ballymean, Northern

Ireland in the 1830's. During his young adult years, he was a member of the Norval Junior Farmers, serving as their president in 1948.

At that time he played hockey on their team, which was coached by the Reverend Leonard Self.

He was a member of the Halton-Peel Jersey Cattle Club for several years and in December of last year was honored at their annual dinner meeting when he was made a life member and

presented with a plaque. On October 21, 1951, he married Ethel Gertrude Hutchinson, daughter of the late Mae and William

of Cheltenham. They had a family of four: Mary Jane (Mc-Clure) Barrett, B.Sc., R.N., of the "Rockwood" district of Mississauga, William John, Georgetown, Islay Christina (University of Windsor) and Stuart Accles (University of Guelph).

The funeral service was held from the J.S. Jones Funeral Home on April 30 with Reverend Peter Barrow, his minister, of Knox Presbyterian Church, conducting the service.


