Summer's for kids

The Halton Hills Recreation and Parks Department is again offering a variety of summer programs for children of all age groups. The programs begin July 2 and registration has begun. For the older children there is a Leader Development Program. The Leader-in-Training (L.I.T.) level is designed for participants aged 12-13 years and includes one week of theory and seventy hours of summer placement in the community. The theoretical portion of the program gives the L.I.T. the knowledge to lead games, songs, crafts, sports, campfire programs and much more to be used in his or her placement. The Leader-in-Training (L.I.T.A.) is geared towards teenagers 13 years and up to train for future positions in recreation leadership. Their training includes two weeks of theory and 100 hours of community placement. The theoretical training will provide the L.I.T.A. with skills in program planning, discipline and leading games, etc. Applications can be picked-up at the Recreation Offices at 25 James Street, (Georgetown) or 40 Mill Street, East (Acton). The Halton Board of Education plans to help reduce alcohol and drug use among students by making school staff aware of how users and traffickers should be dealt with. Georgetown District High School principal Don Baker said, "they (board guidelines) are methods we have been using, the board has just formalized them."

Specific action to be taken comes under the following headings: suspicion of use or intoxication, suspicion of possession, suspicion of trafficking, confirmation of use or intoxication, confirmation of possession and confirmation of trafficking. Through these steps the board hopes to make school staff more active in preventing drug and alcohol use in our schools.
