

Soccer

I often consider myself a fortunate person. Here I am with the privilege of penning a column, able to write basically what I wish, without interference from anyone. On holiday weekends 1 rise reasonably early and proceed to get it down on paper, hammering away on the old clunker of a typewriter. Normally I type away on Sunday evenings late, after a refreshment or two at Brackens (O'Tooles in summer) having chomped earlier at the Copper Kettle. Then I am not always too coherent to myself let alone the readers, if any, and have to await Wednesday to see if I have made

Canada Day, upon reflection, doubles the feeling of fortune, especially when the weather is fine - golf later!

At the same time there are difficulties. Wearing different hats, referee - league president soccer afficianado - columnist can cause a few problems.

You may notice over the next week or so that the Nellson-Dorsey fields goal posts situation has been resolved. A recent meeting with Town Clerk Ken Richardson, Recreation Director Tom Shepard and his staff, Works Superintendent Frank Morette and representatives of town soccer groups, except the ladies group, left very little unsald on both sides. A subsequent five minute meeting with Morette solved the problem and both soccer and flag football are able to use the posts, and nets, to their satisfaction. The soccer people in this town have proved themselves to be very reasonable people over my years in the area and always cognisant of the other users of facilities.

Town owned fields are few and far between. Cedarvale, Emmerson (Moore Park) are the lot. Other fields are leased or borrowed. Neilson-Dorsey, 'Yoder' and school fields are those. There is a distinct shortage of fields in town and prospective growth will not ease the situation, far from it and quite the opposite. There is just not the space available. New development must not be allowed to take place without thought being given to playing field space as a must.

Dare I quote Brampton as an example. Brampton is one of the fastest growing towns in the country, and has reserved 11 acres of parkland per 1000 population, which does not include school grounds. You may note that each housing development has playing space around with park, baseball and soccer accommodated. It has been noted that in the past 10 years vandalism has dropped by 20 per cent in spite of the vast population growth. It is no illusion to draw a comparison between this drop and the insistence upon play areas. Volunteer recreation groups play a huge part in keeping vandalism down in any area. They have a positive impact in minimizing trouble.

The major problem here is the lack of available space. It may well be that we shall have

to seriously consider out of centre of the town play areas. Shepard has had to battle for whatever facilities we do have and all group users have to be considered. Parents can do a great deal to help by letting their councillors become aware of this situation, and letting the recreation department know that we should not see a reduction in the services we already have.

In the 1st Division Butcher lead the way with 12 out of a possible 14 points following a win at Latino, who are bottom with 3 points. 
