

Pair net 10 medals at Police Games

Region's finest win medals

A pair of Halton Regional Police constables walked off with 10 medals at the Ottawa Police Games recently. Const. Annesley Swaminathan, or Raj as he is more often called, said members of other forces were coming up asking for souvenir badges from the Halton force after he and special constable Glen Lawson of Oakville won eight

of the 10 events they entered and placed second in the other two. The track and field events attracted competitors from forces in Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and the United States, Const. Swaminathan said. Const. Swaminathan, a 13 year veteran of the force, is stationed in north Halton. He competed against officers as much as five years younger.

He placed first in the 100 meter, 200 meter, long jump, hammer throw and shot put events and second in discus. The event, however, was not the first track meet he has taken part in. In 1964 He was Ceylon's decathlon champion but has not competed in anything for the last 12 years. Before the event Const. Swaminathan

went through a six week training program where he lost about 20 pounds and regained some of the strength and skill he had in his days with the Ceylon armored corps. He is determined to run for another four or five years and would like to crack some of the Ottawa games records next year. He was running fast enough to break records this year, until he tore a muscle in training.

Despite the injury, however, he still came within inches of the long jump record. His wins in Ottawa have earned him membership in the masters track and field sprint club so he will now be able to train at the Etobicoke Olympian indoor track.

A side effect to all this training has Const. Swaminathan bursting with pride too. His 11 year old daughter, Saroja, was out there with the stop watch clocking him much of the time and she too wants to get into running.
