GLACE PIE

STRAWBERRY

Prepare pastry for 1-crust pie. Fit Into 9" pie pan and prick generously with fork. Bake in hot

Line baked pastry shell with 3 cups fresh strawberries.

oven (450°) 10 to 12 minutes.

Simmer 1 cup strawberries and 3/4 cup water about 3 to 4 minutes. Combine 3 tosp, cornstarch and 1 cup sugar; add to cooked fruit. Cook until thick and clear, stirring constantly, Add 1 tsp. lemon juice. Cool slightly. Pour over berries in pastry shell.

Chill thoroughly. Decorate with sweetened whipped cream before serving.
