Georgetown team drops three games

Young Eagle equal to challenge

This year's Georgetown junior Eagles roster is made up of many young players, but last week the Central Ontario Baseball Association team was forced to play a real young player.

Twelve-year-old Sean Guistini, who is the team's bat boy, was pressed into service Thursday night in Hamilton. The Eagles only had eight players for the game, and rather than having to postpone the game with West Mountain a third time, Eagles manager Dan Guistini elected to put the minor peewee player in right field for the game.

The younger Guistini had a hit in the game, and even stole a pair of bases before scoring on a Neil Sivertson hit. However, the Eagles dropped an 11-3 decision.

At the end of the game, Guistini received a standing ovation from the Hamilton spectators.

Louis Galvao took the loss, allowing 14 hits and walking three. The home team jumped on Galvao in the first inning, scoring eight runs.

Galvao's teammates didn't help matters too much, recording six hits and committing six errors.

"They go hand-in-hand," manager Guistini said. "Their scores go high when we make a lot of errors."

Saturday night the Eagles hosted Mississauga, and again dropped the game 11-3. Like the earlier contest, Georgetown had a problem with errors. The Eagles committed eight in the game.

Rod Wilson took the loss, allowing 17 hits while fanning three. Wilson had a perfect night at the plate, with three singles and a double and a run batted in and he even scored an Eagle run.

Catcher Rat Brooker had two runs batted in also. Louis Galvao had two singles for Georgetown while Scott Farley, Wilson and Paul Guistini had doubles. Guistini's hit should have been a triple, however, he stumbled turning first base and had to settle for the double.

Saturday's game featured a couple of mental lapses by Georgetown concerning running the bases. On two occasions Eagles runners were

thrown out for errant base running, which made Guistini visibly upset.

Sunday afternoon, the bad news continued as the Eagles lost 5-0 to Glanbrook there. Mario Galvao pitched for

Georgetown and did so quite well Guistini said. However, the Eagles left their bats at home as

Georgetown hit Glanbrook pitching for just five hits. Also, the Eagles committed eight

errors.

In fact, Georgetown grounded out or popped up to the Glanbrook infield a total of 19 times in the game. No Eagles hitter got more than one hit in the game.

"I began to think

things were coming together after our two wins a couple of weeks back," Guistini said. "Now I don't know."

Guistini said he is concerned with the play of the Eagles' veterans.

"I can't say I'm pleased," he said. "I don't know whether a couple of guys are getting discouraged, but I don't think they're playing the ball they're capable of."

The Eagles will host first-place Oakville Saturday at the Fairgrounds, then travel to Mississauga Sunday.

NOTES—Outfielder Jay Anderson had to leave both weekend games after his ankle swelled up. In both instances, Scott Farley took his spot.

Favourite Recipes

STRAWBERRY GLACÉ PIE

Prepare pastry for 1-crust pie. Fit into 9" pie pan and prick generously with fork. Bake in hot oven (450°) 10 to 12 minutes. Cool.

Line baked pastry shell with 3 cups fresh strawberries.

Simmer 1 cup strawberries and ¾ cup water about 3 to 4 minutes. Combine 3 tbsp. cornstarch and 1 cup sugar; add to cooked fruit. Cook until thick and clear, stirring constantly. Add 1 tsp. lemon juice. Cool slightly. Pour over berries in pastry shell. Chill thoroughly. Decorate with sweetened whipped cream before serving.
