### Couple seriously injured in car accident

Acton residents Frank Voss and his wife Mabel received major injuries in a car accident last Tuesday (July 12) at 10:46 a.m. when Mr. Voss suffered a heart attack while driving, police said.

Mr. Voss was traveling northbound on the First Line at Sideroad 25 in his 1979 Volkswagon when he lost control of the car and drove it into a

He broke down the first tree he hit and came to rest against another. Mabel Voss is in stable condition at the Georgetown District Hospital.

She suffered broken ankles and ribs and many cuts and bruises, a hospital official said. Mr. Voss was rushed to Sunnybrook Hospital in Toronto where he is in critical condition in the surgical intensive care unit.

The car received \$4,000 to damages. Firefighters were called to remove the couple from the wreckage.

### Dog causes accident

Terrianne Cook of Georgetown received minor injuries when her dog jumped into the front seat from the back, hitting her arm, causing her to lose control, drive into a ditch, hitting a mailbox and culvert on the way.


### Left scene


