"We will worry about them both, but they will be alright together," said Kevin's father John Peaker. "If they work together they will do alright. There's strength in numbers."

Peaker said Saturday the thought of Kevin going out on the ride had not yet fully sunk in. He added he was a little leary about having the riders cycle on busy highways.

"But they've taken all the precautions and are off the major highways," he said.
