McKenny knows both sides of coin

There is a natural friction evident between the media in Toronto and members of the city's pro sports teams. However Jim McKenny can now fully appreciate what both groups go through in the course of their professions.

McKenny, who presently is a sports broadcaster with CITY-TV in Toronto, spent 10 years

with the National Hockey League's Toronto Maple Leafs. The 38-year-old Ottawa native said Monday he has made a transition from being an athlete to that of a broadcast journalist.

"When I was a player, I never knew what the writers wanted," he said. "Today I know what I want, which is television is something that is good, short and quick."

McKenny was in town Monday to take part in the Le Studio golf tournament held at Georgetown Golf and Country Club. The proceeds went to the Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded.

Coming from a pro hockey background, McKenny said he has an advantage over some of his media cohorts. "I'm not a member of that fraternity," he said. "I can see through some

of the mirages they put up."

McKenny also said the broadcast media in Toronto only touch the bare bones of a sports issue. He said the print media does most of the research, which in turn the

broadcasters use when putting together their material. "Thank God for the good writers," he said. "People say 'Dan who?', but they know

Jim McKenny because he is on television. I know some of the print journalists get a little steamed because the broadcasters get all the attention, but I think them when I have the chance."

McKenny said it is somewhat difficult covering the Leafs when hockey season arrives, but added he is not about to sit on a story for the team when the crunch is on.
