**Police car crashed**

An Oakville police car ran into an Acton man's 1981 Ford while responding to an emergency call Saturday at 1 p.m. The accident which happened at Region Road 43 and the Third Line caused \$4,000 damage to each vehicle.

The police car was traveling westbound and passing a car when the 1981 Ford made a left turn in front of it. The police tried to stop but were unable to before hitting the Ford. The third car which the police had passed was not damaged.

At Mountainview Road North and John Street, Roswood developers is anxious to get building a 27 town house unit. That's expected to go ahead shortly.

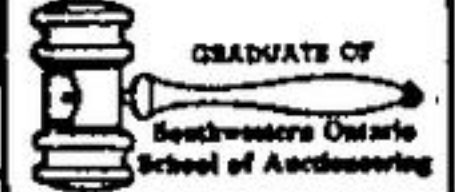
Recently, councillors recommended draft plan approval for 16 single family homes by Gardiner Estates off Maple Avenue, near Parkview Boulevard.

**Crown clubs recipient Bruce used his head**

Bruce Andrews said he didn't even have a headache, after a 20 pound steel weight bounced off his head last fall.

The 33-year old Maple Lodge Farms employee had just been telling his staff of eight the importance of wearing their hardhats when the accident took place.

"It put a mark on my hard hat, where it hit the corner, but it didn't crack the hardhat," Mr. Andrews said. "I was very lucky."

The steel electrical bender fell from an 18 foot height onto the electrical manager's head and through an electrical fibreglass panel, causing about \$300 damage.

The Industrial Accident Prevention Association presented Mr. Andrews with an award for wearing his hardhat, in October 1984.

This month, the electrical manager was made a member of the Association's personal recognition club called the Crown Club.

He qualified for the membership along with 18 others from around the province.

Mr. Andrews has been working at Maple Lodge in Norval for four years. This was the first time he had an accident.

"I stress safety 100 per cent. Everything must be done reasonably safe," he said. "We're very

conscious of what we do before we actually put ourselves in motion."

At Maple Lodge, Mr. Andrews is involved with the fabrication and installation of new electrical equipment. Construction and insulation of expansions or in-plant changes are also done by him and his men.

**YES gets government help**

The Ontario Ministry of Skills Development will be providing more than \$250,000 to a North Halton Youth Employment (Y.E.S.) Counselling Service.

The first instalment of more than \$125,000 was presented Tuesday by Gregory Sorbara, Minister of Skills Development, and Don Knight, M.P.P. Halton-Burlington at the official opening ceremonies of the North Halton Youth Employment Service.

Funding of \$27,324 has been provided for the centre, which will provide employment counselling and job readiness training in the Halton Hills, Milton, Georgetown and Acton areas to young people who face special barriers to employment.

An additional \$103,962 was provided to allow the service to fund a wage subsidy program

which will create 26 full-time and part-time jobs in co-operation with local businesses.

The North Halton Youth Employment Service is sponsored by the YMCA of Metropolitan Toronto. It is funded under the Ontario Youth Employment Centres program, an initiative of the Ministry of Skills Development.
