Social agency wants longevity in their new site

The Acton Social Services and Information Centre (ASSIC) wants some longevity.

That's one of the main concerns, according to board chairman Lorne Doberthien.

Since the ASSIC first moved from their first location at the Acton Y. their walk-in traffic has more than doubled at their Mill Street East location.

The social services centre doesn't have a formal lease, according to board member Gerald Rennie, and the present site can be sold at any time.

For about the past six months, the 12-member board of directors have been giving consideration to another site.

At the top of their list for an ideal location is one that's visible, centrally located and available if need be in short notice.

Property search chairman Gerald Rennie said the committee narrowed their choice of a new site to either the renovated Acton Town Hall, the old Stone School or the former Carpet Corner buil-

ding. The first choice by the property committee is the Acton Town Hall, Mr. Rennie said.

This puts the board of directors on the opposite side of the fence to Acton Councillor Rick Bonnett.

Coun. Bonnett has made a proposal that would put the Acton social services centre in the old Stone School and have the Halton Region pay for renovation costs. The Stone School was

bought by the Town of Halton Hills, but there is some concern that a proper use must soon be found for the building which continues to deteriorate in its present

The committee also Mr. Rennie feels the felt the town hall location town hall site is more appropriate for the needs of the ASSIC. "We have to look at what's best for the social services," he said.

The town hall will be ready perhaps as early as October so if their present site was sold, they could move in almost right away, Mr. Rennie said.

The town hall site also has smaller rooms which are more suitable for counselling clients, he said.

"People should feel comfortable and secure; closeness and contact" are important to the counselling process, he

is closer to the town's centre and is more accessible for seniors with better parking fac-If a decision was made to go ahead with the Stone School site, Mr.

Recently, councillors recommended draft plan approval for 16 single family homes by Gardiner Estates off Maple Avenue, near Parkview Boulevard.


