At the same time they have set up crowd behavior seminars and counsellors teach the fans how to correct their bad behaving friends. Down the centuries the Chinese are noted for their manners and it may well be that this method, unusual method, of solving the problem will work. The level of thugdom in Scotland was reduced several years ago by the closing of drinking establishments in the near vicinity of stadiums. The Scots have not yet solved the problem of religious bigotry as a spark plug of problems. In the southern part of Britain, England, they are introducing identity cards for fans which will be produced upon entry into a ground. Video cameras are to be introduced. The resultant films will show the thugs and vandals. As well as being arrested and jailed for their efforts the cards will be withdrawn and so prevent the entry of the baddies to future games. I hope it works.

The numbers of supporters has drastically dropped in the past ten years except at Man Utd and Liverpool in England. The good supporters have stopped going and the fans left are of the violent kind. The clubs would be left with them as their only source of income if the situation had been allowed to drift along. Apparently the mobs are not from the boondocks or unemployed ranks as believed for some time. Many of the mob are so-called well respected, employed and upright citizens.

Be it Argos, Blue Jays, and whatever soccer team we may have in the future or any other sport - may it never happen here.

# Memories of 1984 Summer Olympics

## Milestone clear in Graham's mind

SHOMBERG—It has been a year since the start of the 1984 Olympic Games but even now Hugh Graham experiences a special feeling after watching his effort.

"I still get shivers just listening to it," Graham said.

Graham also joined an elite group in the individual competition. He was only one of four riders to clear a huge barrier in the second round. The barrier was five feet, three inches high in the front while being five foot, seven inches high in the back. As well, it was seven feet wide.

In the individual competition, his 21 fault points wasn't quite good enough to finish in the top three.

Graham had the unenviable task of being the first rider on the course in the individual rounds. This is a disadvantage to the rider for he does not have the opportunity of watching the others handle the course. Also, the initial competitor does not have the luxury of being able to watch where the other riders are jumping from to gain the perspective of the ideal spot.

"It was disappointing getting shut out of the medals, but getting the

only clear round for Canada in the team competition was exciting," Graham said.

The Games were Graham's first. Prior, Graham had been a member of the silver medal Canadian team that took part in the 1983 Pan Am Games in Caracas, Venezuela.

"The Olympics were a different feeling," Graham said. "Normally when you go to an international competition, there are just riders there. But in LA, all the

Canadian athletes stayed in the same place, and you could look out your window and see the swimming going on. It was just a whole different aspect."

In almost any other sport, being 36 would mean another trip to an Olympic competition would be unlikely. However, such isn't necessarily the case in the equestrian field.

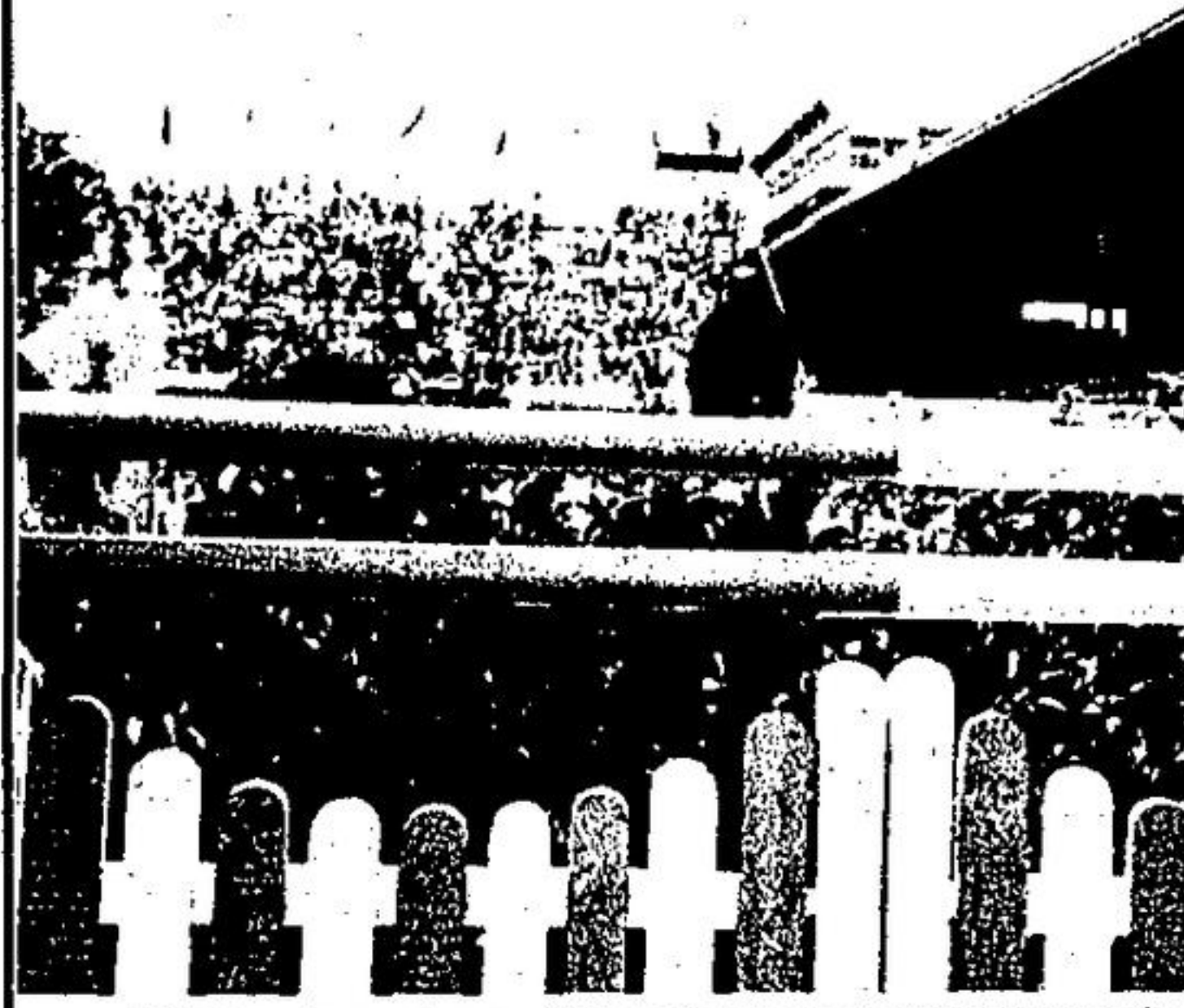
"Fortunately I'm in a sport where you're not finished at an early age," Graham said.

"Our team captain at the Olympics Jim Elder was 51, and the 1984 Games were his seventh."

"Hopefully I've got a few more Games in me still."

"The '88 Olympics are in the plans, and we're (Hillcrest Farms where Graham works) developing some young horses that hopefully we'll have for that."

"It would be nice, though, to bring home a medal from the Olympics."

Graham though was one of four riders to clear the jump during the second round of the individual competition.
