
Hit from behind



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Committee recommends

Turn wrecking yard into heritage park

In a 6-5 vote, town councillors agreed to help in any joint venture to acquire a Limehouse auto wrecking yard.

Council gave permission for a special sub-committee to work with groups to see if property owned by Halton Auto Wreckers can be purchased as a natural heritage park.

In another close vote, council also agreed to a recommendation to bring up the subject of a \$50,000 payment towards the acquisition of the Limehouse property.

The proposed payment would not be brought up again until discussions begin for the 1986 budget.

Not everyone agreed with the recommendations suggested by the wrecking yard review committee.

"When the town enters into a purchase of private enterprise, they're making a big mistake," Coun. Mike Armstrong said. "I think we're looking at problems for the future - we don't need them," he said.

Coun. Ross Knechtel said the money just isn't available from the town coffers. "In fairness to everybody I just don't see where you're going to get the money out of the '86 budget," Coun. Knechtel said.

The recommendation for a payment of \$50,000 should only be seen as an intent by councillors to consider at budget time, Coun. John McDonald said.

Chairman of the sub-committee Pam Sheldon defended the recommendation by saying the \$50,000 figure is a discussion item and council wouldn't have to pay out the full amount.

She said the town is a moving force in solving the wrecking yard problem and by putting some money up front, it shows council is willing to stand up and be counted. "The town has the problem and wants the yard to relocate," she

Coun. Armstrong questioned whether there was a need for another park, adding the lime kilns are not unique.

The sub-committee report also recommended that town by-law enforcement officer Jack Lusty be directed to check all auto wreckers in Halton Hills frequently for infractions and if necessary, lay charges.

In addition, council adopted a recommendation to review a current bylaw which deals with wrecking yards. The town agreed to clarify definitions of parking, storage and what an operative vehicle is.

The report of the wrecking yard review committee was brought to council June 8 but was sent back to be rewritten when it was called 'legal dynamite' by Coun. Armstrong.

However, Coun. Sheldon said the town solicitor found there was no cause for legal concern, but some changes were made to accommodate some councillors.

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
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
