Church A few weeks ago I wrote a column saying on the basis of Genesis 9:6 and Romans 13:1 4 that God had given the state the authority to

execute the murderer. A gentleman from Toronto responded by saying that many people interpreted the Bible differently and that various denominations had gone on record against capital punishment.

With all due respect to the gentleman, my whole response is: So what? Who cares?

I care about people and their feelings. But feelings do not determine what is true and right. In questions of truth about God and man, all that matters is the Bible itself. All that matters is what God's Book says.

What any individual scholar, interpreter, preacher or theologian says does not matter. What any council, convention, denomination, synod or "Church" says does not matter. God's Word carries all the weight. Man's word carries no weight.

If God's Word speaks clearly about something, that settles it. God has spoken! If the Bible does not answer this or that question, then we do not have a word from God about it.

Capital punishment is a case in point. The Bible passages cited are clear in context. It is not a

matter for human inter- joy and comfort -- the

pretation. Creation is another all believers in Christ, example. The Bible teaches creation in six days by God's promises for about six thousand years ago. That settles it. Those who disagree are disagreeing with God.

Another classic case is those sections. The Holy the Lord's Supper. Jesus says, "This is My body ... This is My blood" (Matthew, 28:26-28). Many Christians disagree. They say that the

bread and wine merely symbolize Christ's body and blood.

But it does not matter what Christians say, be they few or be they many. All that matters is what Christ says. He says that the bread and wine are His body and blood, though He does not explain how. Those who want to argue must argue with God.

Why is it so important to hold to the Bible in all . that it says? If we accept only those parts of the Bible that we like, then we are not accepting the Bible's authority at all. We are setting ourselves up as the authorities. We are casting doubt on all the Bible says.

That means casting doubt on the main message of the Bible: forgiveness, life, and salvation because of Jesus' divine sacrifice on the cross in our place.

I accept the authority and truthfulness of the Bible because I accept the authority and truthfulness of its author, *God. I am glad to accept the whole Bible because its major theme is one of



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

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
