
some hard decisions to make from here on in," Russiani sald.

Quality aim of Raiders training camp

Georgetown Chrysler Raiders hope to stress quality rather than quantity at this year's

training camp. General manager Gil Eyre has spent the summer contacting potential players, and said about 30 hopefuls should hit the ice for the opening of camp tonight. A nucleus from last year's squad along with a number of newcomers will be out

competing for positions on the club. "In all fairness, though, the newcomers are going to have to beat out the players from last year," Eyre said. "But It will be a very competitive camp.

"I've gone after the players I wanted, and the majority of them will be coming to camp. I don't think there are many better hockey players than the ones we have coming in."

This year Eyre has had the time to search out and find the players he wanted. He assumed the general managing duties late in August last season, and did not have the time he would like to have had to get players.

Camp begins almost five weeks before the Raiders officially open the 1985-86 Ontario Senior "A" Hockey League season. The Georgetown team start the year at home October 11 hosting Dundas at the Alcott Arena.

"Last year it took us a long time to get on track," Eyre said. "This year I'm hoping by the opening game we will have a good hockey club that won't need many players coming in after Christmas."

This season will be the third for the Raiders in the Senior "A" loop. After finishing fourth overall last year, the Raiders were eliminated from the playoffs by Petrolla Squires. The series was decided in the seventh game, won by the Squires at the Alcott Arena.

Eyre said that memory should be a strong motivator for last year's players.

"I think any player worth his salt has (memory of the playoff elimination)," Eyre said. "I know it is still in my mind.

"I'm really looking forward to this season. I think we're going to open a few eyes. However, I'm not looking forward to training camp because some feelings are going to be hurt," Eyre said. Director of hockey operations Barry Whit-


worth also stresses camp will be an open affair. "As far as I'm concerned all positions are open," he said. "No one from last year's team has a lock on a position. I can guarantee that."

This season only seven teams will compete in the Senior league as Woodstock Gems formally. folded indefinitely in the spring. That should make the league more balanced, Eyre feels.

"What it means is that you'll have seven strong teams that can come into your rink anytime and play one heck of a game," he said.






