They were shut out by Sabres playing hockey waiting game for players

Right now Acton Sabres are playing a waiting game.

Many of those players who could play for the junior "C" club can't even practise with the team due to already being at Junior "B" camps. Many of the "B" teams haven't done much cutting, so those potential players are still not coming to the Acton practices.

Subsequently the numbers have been low at some of the Sabres' practices. For example about 25 players were out at the first session, but only nine showed up at the second.

Wednesday night 30 players attended, but 15 came back for Friday's practice.

What upsets Sabres coach Steve Marshall is that many of the midget players he coached last year are not coming out to the Acton practices. Marshall said even if it is just for getting ice time, the midgets could be practising with the Sabres. When an official decision was being made

on the future of junior bockey in Acton, town interest was keen. At the meeting where a decision was made, the room at the Acton Legion was filled to capacity.

"With the support that was in that room, I thought this would take off. When we started I thought the guys trying to sell sponsors for the sweaters had a hard job and we had the easy job (getting the players).

"As it turns out, we've sold 18 sweaters. Now all we need to get are 18 hockey players," Marshall said.

What hurt the Sabres badly was the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association's decision to allow players to play where they played last year. That means a lot of the midget players who would have no place to play this year can now stay at midget. Another reason for players to stay

Waiting for the players to come means Marshall will have to settle for a later start than he had hoped. However, he is not terribly concerned with that.

"In talking with the other team general managers, the other teams don't get on the ice until the week before the season. It hasn't been a total loss."

Marshall won't be making cuts until the numbers begin to show consistent improvement.

However, there has been one surprise. "Dan Curtis was someone we didn't expect out. But he has come out and done well. He wants

to play." Goal is another spot where the numbers are very low. To date only Acton midget Mike Ormsby has come out to all the practices. The
