

Falcons finish in third spot

The Junior B Falcons closed off their league play season last week with a 2-0 victory over Erin Mills and a 3-2 loss to Clarkson to give them third place behind Clarkson and Burlington.

Thursday night the Juniors took on a rejuvenated Erin Mills team at Cedarvale and struggled to overcome the visitors which they finally did with only five minutes left in the game. It's not that home side was bad but Erin Mills' goalkeeper played so well that he continued to frustrate the Falcons with some excellent saves before bowing to pressure just before the final whistle. The home side's defence was exceptionally good particularly Rick Middaugh who had an outstanding game for the Falcons. Steve Turner, Brinley Hole and Simon Evans made up the rest of the defence that played so well in front of a very dependable Jay Corson in goal.

Bartlett and Lewis up front were playing some excellent soccer but although they continually rounded the visitors' defence they could not beat their hot goalkeeper. With five minutes left in the game (and the Georgetown coach tearing his hair out on the sidelines), Bartlett managed to find the net with the softest goal he has had all season. Two minutes later Lewis hit a fine goal when he volleyed a shot from a corner cross to give the Mills goalkeeper no chance. The Erin Mills team felt that they deserved a tie, but they did not count on the Acton connection. (Corson, Lewis and Bartlett are Acton Boys).

Saturday the Falcons travelled to Clarkson where they have yet to earn a point against the league leaders and once again came away empty handed. The Juniors were outplayed by Clarkson in the first half and found themselves two

goals down. But it was a different story in the second half. Once again Middaugh had an outstanding game for the Falcons and along with some great goaltending from Corson they managed to keep the score contained until the rest of the team elevated their game from good to excellent.

The second half belonged to Georgetown as they came out roaring with a goal scored in fifty seconds of the whistle. The ball was played back to Turner who used Middaugh and Covert before finding Mottershead up front. A neat flick by Mottershead over the Clarkson defence found Bartlett on the run and he finished off with a goal that only he can score bringing his tally to at least one goal scored against every team in the league this season.

The Falcons continued to dominate but once again they came up

against a hot goalkeeper as first Golding was thwarted and then the ever industrious Teetel and Mottershead were robbed of sure goals. An incident fifteen minutes from the end caused the Juniors to lose this game when Adamson, with nobody near him, fell over the ball and gave the opposition a perfect opportunity to grab a loose ball and play forward against a defence that was coming forward and could not recover fast enough to prevent an easy goal being scored by an opportunist centre forward. Five minutes later Flynn scored a well earned goal for Georgetown when he hit a hard shot which the goalkeeper parried but Terry was able to pick off the rebound and find the net.

Next week the Falcons are off to Brampton where they play in the semi final of the league cup against either Clarkson or Burlington.
