# Help make Terry's dream come true

You can participate in Terry Fox's dream to raise money for cancer research by taking part in either the Georgetown or Acton Terry Fox runs Sept. 15.

This year's national motto is "make it twice the success: bring a friend."  
It is the fifth year towns and cities across Canada will be running to raise money for cancer research, but you don't have to run to contribute.  
"It's a do-what-you-can to participate. If you can't go, then sponsor someone," said Nan Hurst, a member of the Acton Terry Fox Run Committee.

"We have had an old man come every year since we started. The last two years he was in a wheelchair," she said. She also listed an elderly woman who rode an adult tricycle and a

woman pushed her two babies among past finishers.

The Acton run is at the Acton District High School track. Runners can begin as early as 8 a.m. or run as late as 3 p.m. Twenty-five times around the track make the 10 km needed to complete the run.

But participants don't have to finish the run nor do they even have to run. Many people walk every year and in Acton they are allowing bicycles on the outside of the track.  
Only people on foot are allowed at the Georgetown event, which takes place at the Georgetown Fairgrounds. Ten times around the one kilometer track and you are finished. They will be starting at 7:30 a.m. and going until 3 p.m.

Nan Hurst emphasized that raising money is the important thing. "We don't care how many people show up. We just want more money raised." Of

course, more runners means more money.

Pledge sheets are available at Acton and Georgetown variety stores and banks. Donations will be taken at the runs from those who do not want to collect sponsors but still want to run, Mrs. Hurst said.

Last year the Acton run raised \$12,400, the Georgetown run raised over \$1,900 and nationally \$13.3 million were raised. All money goes to the Terry Fox Run account.

From there the money goes to the National Cancer Institute research body. Money collected has been used in many projects including the national breast screening study, and the establishment of training centers at the University of Western Ontario and the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto. Terry's parents are honorary chairmen of the National Run Committee.  
Both Halton Hills runs are non-

competitive. There will, however, be a competition among the middle schools in Acton. A draw from all those who enter the Acton run will also be made for a dinner for two at Jack Tanner's Restaurant.

T-shirts, buttons and food will be sold in Acton, and a picnic area will be provided. Olympic hopeful and former A.H.S. student Doreen Uranick will be officially opening the Acton run, Mrs. Hurst said.

Pat Powers, the organizer of the Georgetown run, hopes more high school students will participate. Grade school and junior school students and adults make the best showing, she said.  
The popularity of Terry Fox, who was Canada's youngest winner of the Order of Canada, has made the job of raising money easier.

"It's much easier to ask people to help because they know so much about Terry Fox," Mrs. Powers said.



## Acton hockey concert may get green light

Problems with the proposed rock concert to raise funds for the Acton Minor Hockey Association have apparently been ironed out.

The plan had been threatened by the possibility Ontario's new fire code would prevent organizers from using the Acton arena as they planned.

Town recreation director Tom Shepard has been studying the issue and said the fact there is a working sprinkler system over the ice surface in the arena eliminates many of the problems faced over the fire code.

The concert, set for

Sept. 13, is to raise expense money to entertain Norwegian guests in December who are finishing the second half of an exchange between Acton and Norway.

Two Acton teams visited Norway to play

hockey last Christmas. Questions about whether the concert could proceed as planned were raised when the group first approached council for permission to hold the event in the arena.

Fire Chief Bill Cunningham and Mr. Shepard both had concerns about how the fire code would restrict plans to have large crowds on the ice surface.

Exists from the bleacher area are safe for the arena's capacity of about 600, they said, but there may not be enough exists if the same crowd is on the ice surface. The Acton arena is the only one of the town's three arenas

which has such a sprinkler over the floor area.

Mr. Shepard said he is satisfied everything is all right for his department and he understands the fire department is also content.

"I believe a meeting has been scheduled to go over the rules with the organizers next week," he said, "to make sure they know the maximum number for the liquor license and things like that. I believe the fire department also wants to know how they plan to restrict the numbers on the main floor. As far as I know everything is ok."

Students in the Dealing with Substance Abuse course will learn to assist professionals and parents to identify and help substance users and abusers. The 30-hour course will be offered at the Brampton

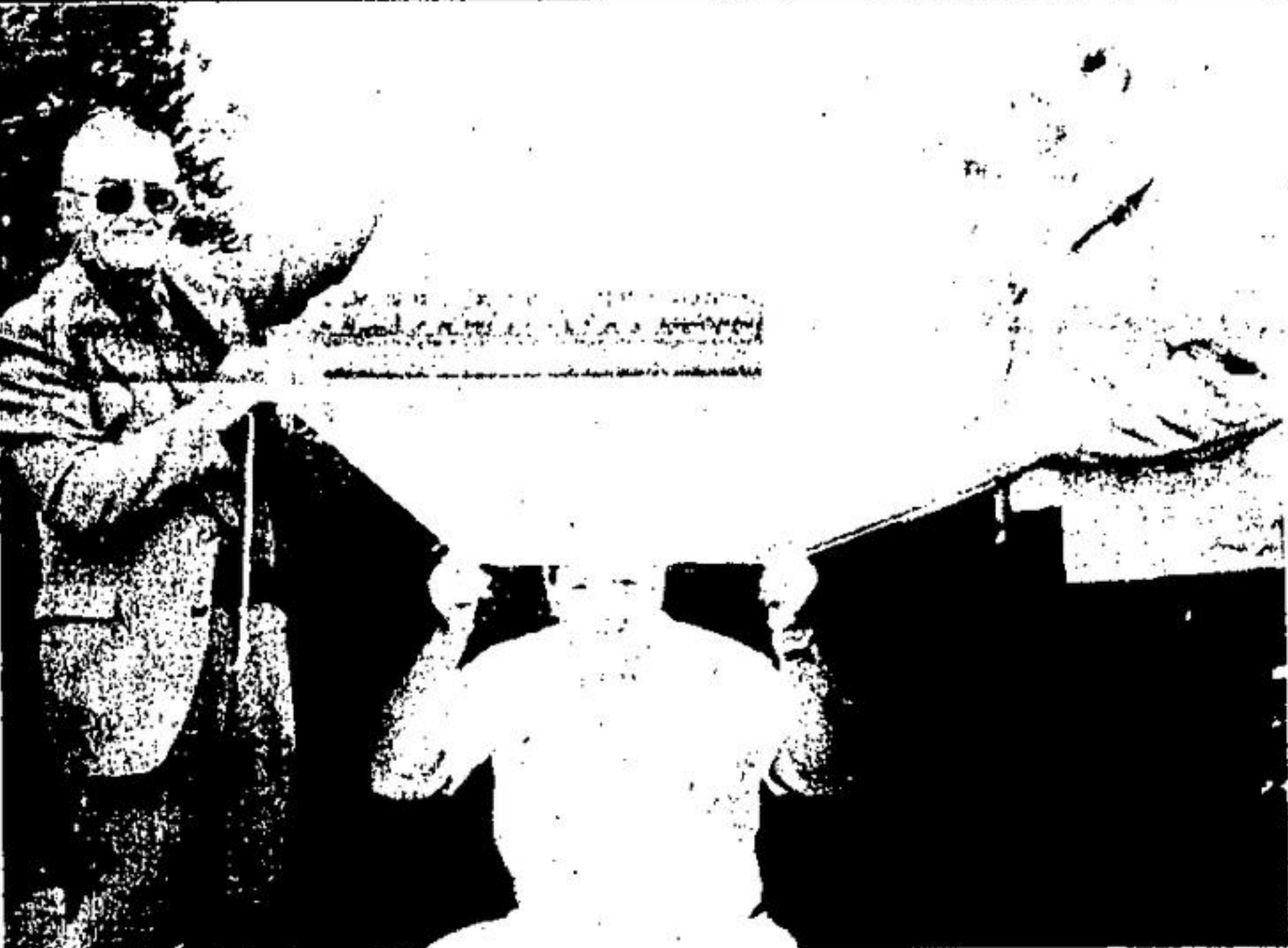
Campus on Wednesdays, beginning Sept. 18 from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. Fee is \$39.

Two alternatives face Halton. One to upgrade the present museum facilities so that they meet the Ministry of Citizenship and Culture's standards or, two, to move the museum to another location and building in the region.

Also, since all the museums in Halton need a collection storage space and conservation laboratory space, there's a third option of creating a central storage facility with the costs

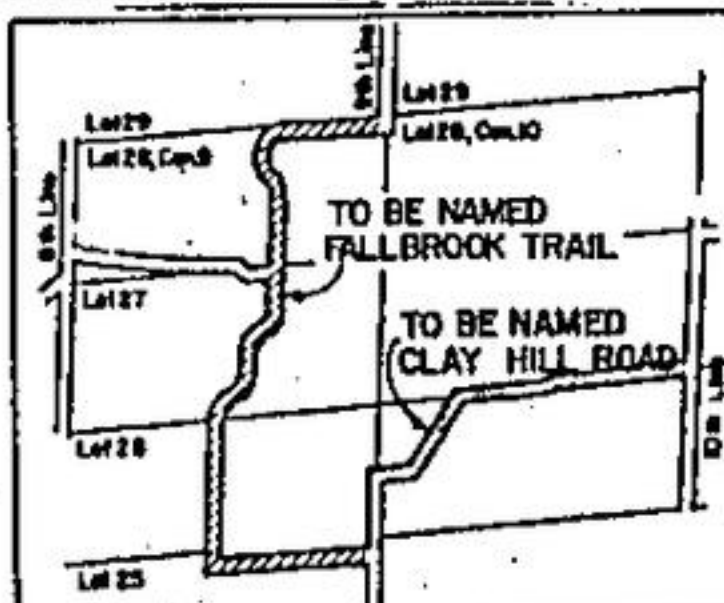
being carried by participating museums.

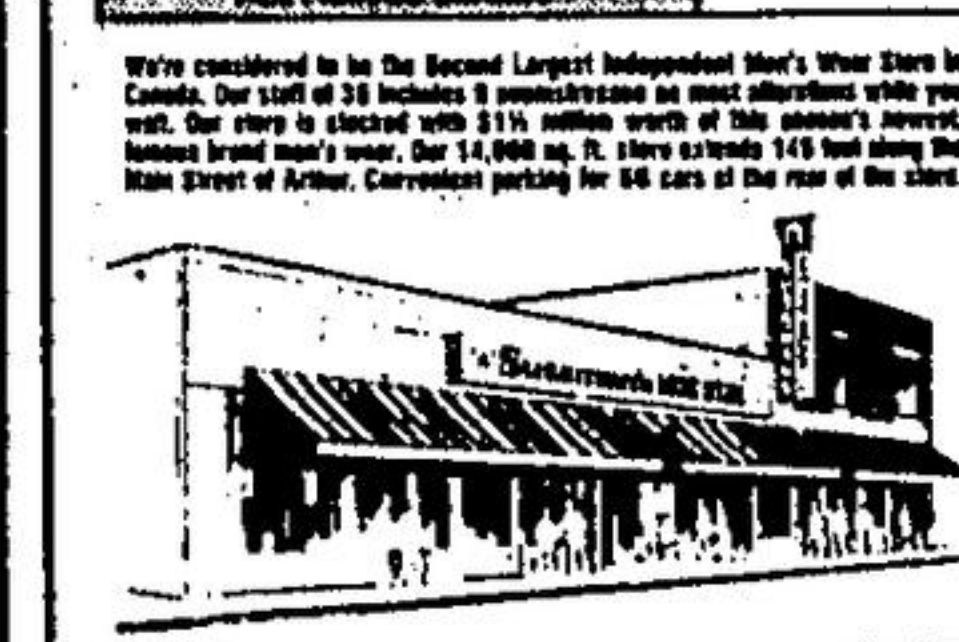
