Shutdown for water control plant

The Georgetown Water Pollution Control Plant is going to be shut down for about five months as the sludge digestor is upgraded, and reopening next August.

Last week, regional councillors approved the tender of Varamae Construction Limited of Thornhill to make renovations and improvements to the sludge digestion system in George-

Varamae's offer of \$1,409,000 was the lowestof the four tenders received by Halton regi-

However, it was still too high, compared with the amount the region has allocated in its budget.

The tender included replacing of the existing digester roof, upgrading the gas system to comply with the latest gas code, providing a gas holding tank to reclaim and use the gas from the digester for heating sludge, and other mis-

cellaneous electrical and mechanical works like piping, ventilation and instrumentation.

To keep within the region's budget, the contractor has agreed to delete the gas holding tank from the contract, making for a \$110,000 saving. This makes the contract value, including a \$50,000 conlingency amount, \$1,299,000.

Varamae is to put five steel piles for the gas tank foundation for \$3,000. This will save the region the cost of providing the pile driving equipment later, when it can afford the gas tank ....

The digestion system can function without the gas tank, but there will be an increased operating cost of \$25,000 annually for fuel oil, Mr. E. Ounput of Varamae warned.

If additional regional money becomes available by April 1, 1986, while Varamae is working at the water pollution control plant, Varamae has agreed to supply and install the gas holding tank for
