### Howitt seeks second term

Dick Howitt is seeking his second term as a trustee but not in Ward 1. Because Wards 1 and 2 were combined, Mr. Howitt wants to run in Wards 3 and 4; Betty Fisher's ward.

Mr. Howitt has lived in Halton Hills on the Tenth Sideroad for 17 years. In 1973 he opened a law practice in Georgetown. He has one daughter, 12, who attends Stewarttown Middle School.

Between 1971 and 1976 Mr. Howitt was on town council. The last year and a half of that term he

was a regional councillor.

He was chairman of the Halton Hills Library Board in 1977. In 1982 he joined the school board.

"The education field is very interesting. I think you have to really like it because it's very time consuming," he said.

Mr. Howitt believes with so many trustees not planning to run again, including Betty Fisher, the board will need experienced trustees.

"It takes you a while to get used to any organization. I think I'm just nicely getting started having put in the first term.

Mr. Howitt is a member of the North Halton Consolidation Committee which was organized to help determine which schools will close because of declining enrollments.

Other important issues are separate school funding (Bill 30) and funding for special education (Bill 82), he said.

### Trustee Bruce in the running

Arlene Bruce, mother, former teacher, and lifelong resident of Halton Hills will try to retain her position as trustee for the Halton Board of Education.

Mrs. Bruce is completing her fifth year on the board; she is school trustee for Ward 1. The combining of Wards 1 and 2 this month because of new regional reassessments makes Mrs. Bruce's election riding both wards.

Mrs. Bruce lives on Cole's Court in Esquesing which is one mile east of Acton on the Fourth Line north of Highway 7 on the border of Esquesing and Acton.

"I've been very interested in the social situation and condition of the town (Acton)," Mrs. Bruce said.

Trinity United Church in Acton where she has held almost all volunteer positions including chairman of the board is one of her community interests. She has also worked on the steering committees of Meals on Wheels and the Acton Tennis Club.

Mrs. Bruce is running again because "we have just come on the edge of many big issues. There are lots of things coming up we need people with experience for," she said. "I don't know all the answers, but at least I know where to find the answers, the questions to ask," she said.

Three important issues Mrs. Bruce said require experience are Bill 82 which is affecting the amount of money given to special education, the consolidation committee, concerned with distribution of students during times of declining enrollments, and the problems separate school funding is causing and will cause, she said.

### Irene wants election vote

Mrs. McCauley has lived in Halton Hills since 1971 with her husband John who is the assistant director of the National Hockey League officials. They have two children attending Holy Cross and one attending St. Michael's in Toronto.

Holy Cross is the McCauley's church where Irene McCauley is a lector and member of the altar society. Among the

organizations she belongs to are the Red Cross, and the Georgetown Ladies Basketball League which she ran.

With full funding of Catholic high schools coming Mrs. McCauley believes the next few years will be very exciting. "It is our historical right to have full funding," she said.

During the five years she has been on the board it has continued to develop, she said. "It's a unique system and I'd like to see that uniqueness stay," she said.

One of the developments she would like to see in this area is a Catholic high school to be shared with Milton.

"Catholic schools are so overcrowded. I hope within the next couple of years we get a Catholic high school in this area," she said.

The big issues for her are to see that full funding is attained and to ensure that Halton Hills gets a Catholic high school, she said.

### Silver Creek homes get draft approval

Council gave draft approval to a plan of subdivision in Silver Creek by Rostrevor Developments Limited Monday.

Effective for three years, the draft plan approval requires the developer to contribute to the upgrading of Sideroad 27 and provide a storm drainage report showing how stormwater is to be conducted on and off the property.

As well, Rostrevor will have to submit soils report which includes plans for pavement design for the internal street on the property. A siltation report was also required of Rostrevor for the handling of siltation on the site during all phases of construction.

The town engineer is to be provided with a tree saving plan which won't remove trees unless they interfere with the construction of the road or houses or are in an unstable state.

Rostrevor has agreed that no explosives will be used during construction. To satisfy abutting neighbor Doug Pattison, the developer is to construct a six foot chain link fence along the

Pattison property prior to occupancy of any of the new homes. There are 16 estate homes to be built on a cul de sac road each with a minimum lot size of 1.5

acres. The property lies within the Niagara Escarpment Commission's development control area, meaning the town hasn't zoning jurisdiction in this case.

### Ward 4 candidate emerges

Mr. Cook is unopposed in the riding, which represents the east and south portions of Georgetown. Incumbent Harry Levy has retired, Coun. Mike Armstrong hasn't made a public statement of his intentions and Coun. Marilyn Serjeantson said she will seek the Ward 4 regional seat.

Mr. Cook is a manufacturer's agent for

GordonPly, a firm that imports hardwoods from around the world.

The graduate of York University and Ryerson Polytechnical Institute (Bachelor of Arts, Business Administration) has lived in Georgetown for four years.

The father of two children is vice-president of the Halton Hills Toastmasters, a hockey coach and a member of the board of education's consolidation committee. He is also an elder at Knox Presbyterian Church and has been with the North Halton Scouts for five years. "I



AL COOK has the time and ability to be part of the decision-making process," he said.

The community will be going through a lot of social changes when the town grows, the candidate said.

There will be a need to maintain community pride by living in Georgetown, he said. The town will also require adequate sewage facilities to "accompany the changes in the community," Mr. Cook said.

He said his upbringing on a farm in Strathroy is one reason why he's approachable and willing to listen. "I like people," he said.

#### PUFFED CEREAL CRUNCH

- 6 cups puffed cereal (Wheat, corn, rice, millet)
- 1 cup unsalted peanuts
- 1 cup sunflower seeds
- 1/4 cup sesame seeds
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup molasses
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/4 cup margarine or butter

In a large bowl, combine cereals, nuts and seeds. Combine sugar, molasses, honey and butter or margarine in a small sauce pan. Stir over low heat until smooth and boiling. Pour over cereal, mixing to coat. Spread out in shallow pan. Bake at 275° for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool. Store in covered container.
