"The most important aspect of this municipal job is making sure people know you're approachable, available, and you get back to people, I feel," Counc. McDonald said.

He was first elected in 1978 as a town councillor and since 1982 has served as regional councillor.

He noted some of the inroads made by council this term included establishing a business development committee to look at the problems facing developers and businesses in town.

The councillor sits on the Georgetown Business Improvement Area and on the Georgetown Memorial Hospital board. Both are council appointments.

A real estate salesman with Johnson and Associates in town, Counc. Carney is married to Margaret and they have eight children. Julie, 16, and Dan, 30, are still living with them.

Counc. Carney sat three years as a Georgetown Separate School board trustee 25 years ago. In the late sixties, he sat for two terms on the land division committee and the committee of adjustment. He also sat on the planning board for three years.

Social service head looks for an office

By ANI FEDERIAN Herald Staff Space is apparently at a premium in the region's health and social services department.

Regional councillors learned Wednesday that social services director Debbie Oakley doesn't have an office to work in.

Oakville Counc. Peter Arch said she has no where to speak confidentially with clients or her own staff. Improvements or additions to the regional building on Bronte Road will take three to five years and Counc. Arch thinks that's too long. He wants the region to rent out space for the social services department in either Oakville or Burlington.

"They are crowded in there just much much too closely together," Counc. Arch said. Currently, the social services department operates in 43,011 square feet.

"Quite frankly, the open concept is deplorable for the director of social services," Oakville Counc. Jackie Cutmore said.

The department immediately requires 6,250 square feet, Chief Administrative Officer Dennis Perlin notes in a report.

Although more space was created in the green

regional building when the 39 public works staff moved out to their own building in July, 1982, the space was easily taken over by the social services and finance departments and by their computer room requirements.

Burlington Counc. Joan Little noted there aren't any government grants available to the region as regards moves or expansions. She suggested perhaps the lunchroom downstairs could be moved out to an outside trailer.

Money is safe

Halton regional councillors patted themselves on the back for not having any money invested in the Canadian Commercial Bank, last week.

The bank collapsed following the Labor Day weekend, despite a rescue attempt by the federal government in mid-March.

"Fortunately we set some very substantial financial policies which paid off," Burlington Counc. Joan Little said.

Library micro-computers

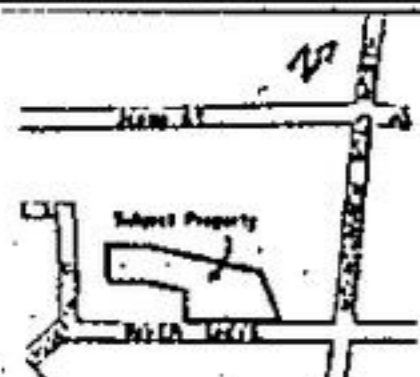
