ELECTION UPDATE

Who is running where

The Herald has charted out the 'whos' and 'wheres' for the Nov. 12 municipal elections. The following is a list of the candidates running for mayor, town council, regional council or school board. In each ward, a constituent picks two town council representatives, and one regional councillor. When there is only one candidate running for a position, he or she is acclaimed.

The town boundaries are separated into wards: One (Acton); Two (Esqueing -- the predominantly rural lands beyond Georgetown and Acton); Three (Georgetown north and west of Rexway Boulevard and west of Sinclair Avenue north of Guelph Street. Ward Four is represented approximately by lands south and east of Rexway Boulevard and east of Sinclair Avenue, north of Guelph Street. A long time town councillor thinks it's time for a change. Coun. Marilyn Serjeantson, 43, is ready to move on to the regional stage as regional councillor for Ward 4.

"The more you're involved in local politics, the more you venture off into regional government," Mrs. Serjeantson said. "I've been in local politics long enough. I feel it's time to step up."

February 1977 when a by-election was held to fill a vacancy.

Since then, Mrs. Serjeantson has been put back in the town council seat again and again. "I enjoy politics," she said. "I have the time and the concern."

A former nurse, the Regan Crescent resident moved to Georgetown with her husband Ed back in 1968. Her four sons, Brett, 16, Kirk, 14, Wade, 13, and Garth, 5, were all born here.

Mrs. Serjeantson belongs to the Canadian Ski Patrol System, plays tennis with the Gordon Alcott Club, sits on the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, the regional transportation for the physically disabled committee and the Centennial School Group committee.

A 29-year old Elmore Drive resident announced his intention to run for town council in Ward 1 Thursday.

Maury Saad (pronounced sayd) has lived in Acton five years, moving from Montreal when the construction company he worked for left Quebec because of the political instability.

Today, Mr. Saad works for the Ontario Legislative Assembly, managing its computer department.

Married to Sharon, the couple have two daughters, Cynthia, 8, and Stephanie, 9. A third child is on the way, due November end.

A member of several professional organizations, namely, Computer Information Processing Society, the IBM users group called "Common", and the Data Processing Management Association, Mr. Saad feels his business background will help him as a councillor.

"I could help them get better things out of their money," he said. "I would like to be more involved with the budgeting end of it. I have a good background in streamlining and getting money's worth."

One of the main reasons Mr. Saad decided to throw his hat in the ring was his concern over the Acton Chamber of Commerce welcoming an Energy From Waste plant to incinerate garbage.

"I want to make sure they do the right thing about that," he said. "I think that if a bad decision is made there, the ramifications could be substantial. I want to make sure we get all the facts down before they go ahead with it."

This is Mr. Saad's first attempt at politics and he's looking forward to representing Ward 1 residents.
