DQ downs O'Tooles for football title

The Greek-O'Toole dynasty was toppled on Sunday as Dairy Queen captured their second G.F.F.L. title. As pundits predicted, the championship game was a splendid affair, with the two best G.F.F.L. teams trading scores and maintaining suspence until the final whistle. That the edge went to Dairy Queen in the end, was a tribute to their preparedness and professionalism. Well coached and strong at every position, the Queens maintained a consistently high level of play this year, and dispensed with the on field blckering that plagued their efforts in previous seasons.

Dairy Queen opened the scoring on a TD by Ron Lunn. That six point lead held until the second quarter when O'Toole Mark Russel scored the first of his three touchdowns to tie the game. Before half time, Randy Lunn for D.Q. and John Karolidas for O'Tooles added majors to deadlock to the game at 12-12.

O'Tooles moved ahead of the Queens in the third quarter on Marvelous Mark Russel's second and third TDs of the game. Wayne Stauslis complemented one of the majors with a two-point convert and James Allan kicked a single on the other. Dairy Queen countered with a touchdown by Howie Hulme, but found itself in a 27-18 hole at the end of the quarter. Then came the dramatic finale. Ron Lunn scored his second touchdown of the game to bring Dairy Queen within

three points of O'Tooles. For a while, it seemed like that would be as close as the Queens would get again they would fall excruciatingly short of claiming victory over O'Tooles in the playoffs.

But then the unexpected happened. The ball was in O'Toole possession with only a few minutes play when Rick Baldwin decided to throw one of his patented long bombs to Mark Russel. Baldwin has lived by the long ball in the past -- his ability to use it successfully to extract his team from difficult situations is legendary. This time however, it was his downfall. Lacking its customary accuracy, the pass deflected off Russel and into the arms of Dairy Queen defender Gary Lockwood. The Queens capitalized on the turnover with Howie Hulrae's second touchdown of the game with only three plays remaining. Jeff Lockwood kicked the point after and the Queens led 31-27. On the final play of the game Baldwin made one last desperate bid to score, but to no avail this time he was intercepted by Herb

Raiders talk of return

"When I heard Georgetown was where we would play our first exhibition game I thought it was pretty ironic ." Lowe said. "It was a lot of

Lowe a member of the '84 Olympic team joined the Raiders last January after playing with the national team which won the Spengler Cup. He also played with the Olympic squad that played a touring Russian team across Canada.

Lowe is back in school working towards a teaching certificate in history and health and physical education. He started out with the Olympic team early las month, but decided to come back to school.

"Going for the teaching certificate and playing with the national team was too heavy to combine," he said. "I decided to come back and concentrate on school and maybe play with the national team on holidays and during

my spare time. 'Olympic coach Dave King mentioned to me that I could play in the '88 Olympics which would be a big thrill not only because the winter games are in Calgary, but also because I'd be getting a chance to play in a second

Lowe said he noticed a difference in the Raiders of this year from the

team he played for last season. "They're faster due to the young players they have," he said. "I was really impressed with goalie Dave Tataryn.

"They outplayed us in the first period, but as the game went on we got more used to playing," Lowe said.

Despite only seven new faces on the Blues' squad this year Lowe feels the team will almost be a rookie

"There are 10 guys who were in their first year last year so we'll be a young team. I think the major goal will be to maintain through the regular season and improve in the playoffs."

Last year the Blues finished first in the Ontario University Athletic Association standings, but lost to York in the playoffs. The Yeomen went on to win the national collegiate championships.

"York will be in the back of our minds, but there are a lot of other good teams out there," Lowe said.

Goaltender Sparrow had a special reason for wanting to play well. He wanted to show he could play and prove the Raiders wrong for not playing him last season. Sparrow joined the Senior club at the end of the season after playing with the Junior "B" Geminis. "After what happened last year I

wanted to get back," he said, "The team was a little late in getting me my expense money and I thought I should have played in the Collingwood game (9-1 loss for the Raiders in their last regular season game)." Sparrow, who has made the Blues'

team, didn't have a good initiation into the game. A minute into the third period he took a holding penalty when he grabbed Doug Fry's stick and hung on as Fry had an open net on the play. "The first couple minutes I wasn't

The unexpected element was Blakelock's use of the pass exclusively in overtime. The winners threw more times (5) in the extra period than they did the entire game (4). In overtime the ball was on the

10-yard line and each offence had four chances to score. Blakelock advanced to the four-yard line on a pass interference call on Rebels' Wayne Brunton, then had two incomplete passes. However on the fourth play they passed for the major, then passed for the two-pointer.

Running success led Rebels' coach Rick Redshaw to stick on the ground, and Georgetown got to the four-yard line after three plays. However back Tim Ricensky, who spearheaded the Rebel running game, left with an injury after the third play.

Replacement Mark Dunning, who was the starting tight end, couldn't find the handle on a handoff and Blakelock recovered the fumble to preserve the

Redshaw said although Racinsky got hurt he elected to stay on the ground for a reason.


Should the Rebels maintain their first place position going into the playoffs they will get the home field advantage and play the fourth place team in the West division. That game would likely be played Oct. 17th.


