Ron Lunn scored his second touchdown of the game to bring Dairly Queen within

three points of O'Tooles. For a while, it seemed like that would be as close as the Queens would get again they would fall exuberantly short of claiming victory over O'Tooles in the playoffs.

But then the unexpected happened. The ball was in O'Toole possession with only a few minutes play when Rick Baldwin decided to throw one of his patented long bombs to Mark Russel. Baldwin has lived by the long ball in the past - his ability to use it successfully to extract his team from

difficult situations is legendary. This time however, it was his downfall. Lacking its customary accuracy, the pass deflected off Russel and into the arms of Dairly Queen defender Gary Lockwood. The Queens capitalized on the turnover with Howie Hulme's second touchdown of the game with only three plays remaining. Jeff Lockwood kicked the point after and the Queens led 31-27. On the final play of the game Baldwin made one last desperate bid to score, but to no avail - this time he was intercepted by Herb Hulme.

Raiders talk of return

It seemed only fitting a pair of former Raiders had a determining affect in University of Toronto Varsity Blues 44 tie with the Georgetown Chrysler team Thursday.

Forward Darren Lowe assisted on the tying goal with seven seconds left to play while goaltender Chris Sparrow kicked out 16 of 17 shots he faced in the third period to keep the Blues within

striking distance when down 3-1.

"When I heard Georgetown was where we would play our first exhibition game I thought it was pretty ironic," Lowe said. "It was a lot of fun."

Lowe a member of the '84 Olympic team, joined the Raiders last January after playing with the national team which won the Spengler Cup. He also played with the Olympic squad that played a touring Russian team across Canada.

"There are 10 guys who were in their first year last year so we'll be a young team. I think the major goal will be to maintain through the regular season and improve in the playoffs."

Last year the Blues finished first in the Ontario University Athletic Association standings, but lost to York in the playoffs. The Yeomen went on to win the national collegiate championships.

"York will be in the back of our minds, but there are a lot of other good teams out there," Lowe said.

Lowe is back in school working towards a teaching certificate in history and health and physical education. He started out with the Olympic team early last month, but decided to come back to school.

"Going for the teaching certificate and playing with the national team was too heavy to combine," he said. "I decided to come back and concentrate on school and maybe play with the national team on holidays and during my spare time."

"Olympic coach Dave King mentioned to me that I could play in the '88 Olympics which would be a big thrill not only because the winter games are in Calgary, but also because I'd be getting a chance to play in a second Olympic Games."

Lowe said he noticed a difference in the Raiders of this year from the team he played for last season.

"They're faster due to the young players they have," he said. "I was really impressed with goalie Dave Tataryn."

"They outplayed us in the first period, but as the game went on we got more used to playing," Lowe said.

Despite only seven new faces on the Blues' squad this year Lowe feels the team will almost be a rookie contingent.

Sparrow, who has made the Blues' team, didn't have a good initiation into the game. A minute into the third period he took a holding penalty when he grabbed Doug Fry's stick and hung on as Fry had an open net on the play.

"The first couple minutes I wasn't too sure," he said. "I came in cold and took the penalty. I was a little nervous because this was my first game at this level."

Sparrow was at the Blues' camp last year, but with starter John Kemp and backup Kevin Hamlin no positions were available. However now Kemp is playing with the national team, so Sparrow decided to give it his best shot.

Thursday the Redmen had balanced scoring and were able to get a lot of younger players some court time.

Two of Acton's first three games have been tight contests as the Redmen defeated Georgetown Rebels

32-27 in the opener. In both games Craig has come up with good performances to give her squad the victory in both cases.

Redmen coach Anne Andrews said however that doesn't mean the other players can't score. She said it is going to take a little more time before some others are ready to contribute.

"We do have others who can score. We've just got to be a little patient," she said.

The juniors travelled to Collingwood to take part in a tournament there on the weekend. Acton played its first game with the attitude many young players would see action.

The Redmen dropped their first game 40-26 to Lieberman of Scarborough. In their second game the Acton squad defeated St. Mary's of Kitchener 30-26 then beat Midland 34-19 in the final.

The senior team took it on the chin this week, dropping two league games. Acton dropped a 46-41 decision Tuesday to T.A. Blakelock and 34-22 Thursday to Milton.

Tuesday the Redmen had a 37-31 lead after the third quarter, but Blakelock scored five field goals and five foul shots while the Redmen could only counter with four foul shots in the final frame.

Judy Thompson had 18 points for Acton while Boo Tufford clipped in with 14 points.

Thursday in Milton Andrews said the loss wasn't due to a lack of trying. She said when Acton had chances to capitalize they couldn't.

Rebels lose opener in overtime period

In any season opener it's safe to expect the unexpected. Such was the case last Tuesday as Georgetown junior football Rebels dropped at 14-6 overtime decision to T.A. Blakelock at the GDHS field. The game was the first for both clubs.

The unexpected element was Blakelock's use of the pass exclusively in overtime. The winners threw more times (5) in the extra period than they did the entire game (4).

In overtime the ball was on the 10-yard line and each offence had four chances to score. Blakelock advanced to the four-yard line on a pass interference call on Rebels' Wayne Brunton, then had two incomplete passes. However on the fourth play they passed for the major, then passed for the two-pointer.

Running success led Rebels' coach Rick Redshaw to stick on the ground, and Georgetown got to the four-yard line after three plays. However back Tim Ricensky, who spearheaded the Rebel running game, left with an injury after the third play.

Replacement Mark Dunning, who was the starting tight end, couldn't find the handle on a handoff and Blakelock recovered the fumble to preserve the win.

Redshaw said although Racinsky got hurt he elected to stay on the ground for a reason.

"The blockers weren't hurt so I figured why not," he said. "I was pretty happy with everyone, but it is tough to lose in overtime."

Blakelock coach Rock Osborne said just because his club didn't pass much did not mean the receivers weren't up to par.

"We felt we had good receivers and decided to give it a try," he said. "This being the first game you never know."

The loss did away with a fine game from Rebels' offence and defence. Blakelock's only other score came off a fumbled punt return that the visitors recovered in the end zone.

The offence moved the ball, but fumbles killed many potential scoring drives. The Rebels had many good scoring chances late in the game, but couldn't get on the scoreboard until the latter stages of the final quarter when Racinsky bulled over from the two-yard line. Had Georgetown been able to convert the major, the Rebels would have won, but the attempt was blocked, thus forcing overtime.

Quarterback Rob Gramada teamed up with receiver Don Rea for 25 yards on the drive for the tying major. The game has a little more meaning for both coaches. Redshaw played junior ball as a youngster at Blakelock under coach Osborne.

The Rebels play E.C. Drury today, then host Milton Tuesday.
