ACTON Sabres had a rough initiation last week into the Mid-Western Junior "C" ranks.

The Sabres dropped an 8-1 loss Wednesday against Fergus Green Machine, and a 10-7 decision Friday night in Orangeville.

Wednesday penalties proved to be the determining factor for the hometown Sabres as Fergus had six power play tallies in the game. The Sabres got their lone goal in the first period when Wayne McMillan notched the franchise's first tally in Junior "C" competition in a very long time. Appropriately, it was on the power play.

Referee called a total of 95 minutes in penalties against the Sabres Wednesday night, including a spearing infraction on Dan Curtis in the second period. Curtis was penalized for allegedly spearing a linesman.

Sabres' assistant coach Dave Anderson, who was behind the bench for the team's first two

games, said he didn't see the incident. In fact Anderson didn't know anything was wrong until he noticed Curtis was being waved from the faceoff circle for no apparent reason. Curtis was being waved because he wouldn't apologize to the linesman under instructions from the bench.

"I thought that was a little out of line," Anderson said. "If he did something wrong, then penalize him."

The explanation Anderson got was Curtis was skating and swinging his stick by virtue of the momentum in his arms. The stick apparently struck the linesman, who said it was intentional.

The club is writing a report to the league, and Curtis could face a suspension of up to five games.

Friday in Orangeville the Sabres fell behind 4-1 after the first period, and 9-6 after two periods. Acton dominated play in the final frame, but couldn't mount a

successful comeback as the hometown team hung on for the 10-7 win, scoring in the empty net in the dying seconds. No Acton scoring statistics were available.

"There was a big improvement from the first game to the second," Anderson said. "The big difference was in desire."

"We were down in Orangeville and came back," he said. "If we can stay out of the penalty box we can compete when we're even."

The Sabres were in Caledon last night, and host Orangeville tonight at the Acton Arena. Faceoff time is 8:30 p.m.

NOTES-Goalie Mike Ormsby faced 55 shots against Fergus... Some new faces could be in the Acton lineup soon. The club will look at a pair of goalies, a defenseman and four wingers. Two are locals in Bruce Canary and Gary White... A goaltender with Junior experience as a member of the Markham Waxers has shown

interest in coming out... Coach Steve Marshall didn't make the club's first two games last week. He was honeymooning in Florida... One thing Marshall aims to cut down on are the penalty minutes. "I'm not one for penalties. I hate them. I like a disciplined hockey club..." The Sabres are halfway in players they're allowed to sign as 12 have been inked.

The Sabres signed goalie Tom Hill and winger Bob Deann from Brampton. Both saw action last night in Caledon and will play tonight against Orangeville.

Runner's notebook

Many people have been talking for months about the upcoming duel between Grete Waitz and Joan Benoit at this year's New York City Marathon.

The last time these two went head to head was in the Olympics. Benoit, of course, took the gold only three months after knee surgery. Waitz claimed the silver. As it would be learned later this was the first time the Norwegian hadn't won a marathon she had completed.

Forgotten, and in fourth behind these two talented runners was another Norwegian - Ingrid Kristiansen.

Kristiansen, since the Olympics, has emerged as the top female marathoner in the world and could be the first woman to break 2:20 when she runs the America's Marathon in Chicago Sunday.

"I was very disappointed after Los Angeles because I didn't try to win. I didn't try. I should have gone with Benoit, I was in the group behind and she disappeared," Kristiansen was quoted as saying.

Two months before the Games Kristiansen set a world mark in the 5,000 metres of 14:58.89 - the first woman to break 15 minutes - but also raced in the World Cross Country championships and the London Marathon. She is the first to say that maybe she overtrained prior to the Olympics.

But did she bounce back? Last winter in Oslo she set up a treadmill in her basement, surrounded by posters of Waitz, Mary Decker and a big one of Benoit setting the marathon record at Boston in 2:22.43. She then proceeded to do 150 kilometres a week on the device rather than brave the snow-covered roads. She could adjust resistance and incline to any situation she wished.

When Kristiansen emerged from her basement in April she ran the London Marathon in 2:21.06. This was over a minute and a half faster than Benoit's previous mark. She may have to replace those posters with some of herself for inspiration.

In July she destroyed the world 10,000 meter track record in 30:59.42 to become the first woman to break 31 minutes. With that mark she became the first female to hold world records in the 5,000, 10,000 and marathon at the same time.

For those interested in adversity Kristiansen gave birth to a son just two years ago and set her 5,000 metre mark 10 months after his birth. Kristiansen concedes her running has improved since her pregnancy.

With that Kristiansen will be running unchallenged in Chicago. Certainly no woman will be near her. Conceivably there could be less than 20 men ahead of her. Hopefully one of the runners will help her vault past the 2:20 mark and into a marathon history. It will definitely make New York an interesting race a week later.

Running back Tim Racinsky had two touchdowns as Georgetown District High School junior Rebels defeated E.C. Drury 19-6 in East Halton action Wednesday in Milton.

The win lifted the Rebels to a 1-1 record so far this year. Racinsky cashed in with his first major in the second quarter when his six-yard run capped on a Rebel drive. Quarterback Rob Gramada also hooked up with receiver Gord Rea in the second period on a 30-yard pass play for the Rebels' other major in the first half.

Racinsky had the Rebels last major on a 45-yard run. The play went to the right, with tight end Mark Dunning and tackle Dave Barrow executing a trap block that Rebel coach Rick Redshaw said was big enough for Racinsky to "drive a truck through."

Redshaw said the win was a good one for his club.

"The kids got a lot of confidence when they saw they could move the ball," Redshaw said. "Last week (14-6 loss to Blakelock) we moved the ball well, but fumbles hurt. This game we didn't have any fumbles."

The play on which Racinsky scored in his long run hasn't by accident, Redshaw said.

"We worked on that play all week, and it worked like clockwork," he said.
