For residents of the Mountainview Road South area, the regional investigators are out scratching their heads over the reasons for flooding. When they identify where the problem originates and how it can be solved, the region will take on its responsibility to solve the flooding.

The rest of the streets named above appear to have storm water flooding problems. Regional staff don't think it has anything to do with the sanitary sewers. Together with Halton Hills staff, regional staff have entered into preliminary investigations and discussions to determine a likely cause for the floodings and how they can be prevented.


