**Transfer site popular**

The temporary transfer station operating on Armstrong Avenue in Georgetown is proving to be more popular than anticipated this year.

Perhaps because of increased garbage hauling costs to rural residents, use of the transfer station is projected to be up by an extra 5,500 vehicles by year end.

Regional staff had anticipated 30,000 vehicles would be dumping off "no charge" loads of under 150 kilograms this year, and negotiated an agreement with Leferink Transfer Ltd. for that amount.

However, they're having to renegotiate with the operator of the transfer station for the additional cars.

It means an extra \$20,000 for the receipt of the wastes and their transfer to the regional landfill in Burlington, and the transfer of recyclable materials to appropriate dealers.

The number of vehicles using the transfer station has been increasing steadily over the past two years. In 1983, 20,347 vehicles dropped off wastes at the site; in 1984, it was 29,959.

The region pays Leferink \$4 for each vehicle that uses the station for

the "no charge" service.

Regional councillors are expected to approve the additional expense today (Wednesday) at their meeting. The region has approved \$120,000 for the "no charge" service, and another \$9,890 for maintenance of weigh scales, scrap metal and newsprint containers.

Regional staff had anticipated 30,000 vehicles would be dumping off "no charge" loads of under 150 kilograms this year, and negotiated an agreement with Leferink Transfer Ltd. for that amount.

However, they're having to renegotiate with the operator of the transfer station for the additional cars.

**Favourite Recipes**  
**CREAM CHEESE POUND CAKE WITH POPPY SEEDS**  
1 cup butter  
1, 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla  
4 eggs  
2 1/4 cups sifted flour  
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
**FILLING:**  
1/4 cup poppy seeds  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 tsp. grated lemon peel  
1/4 tsp. vanilla  
In small bowl combine filling ingredients and set aside.  
In large bowl cream butter and cream cheese until light and fluffy. Add sugar and vanilla, beat well about 5 minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each one. Sift flour and baking powder together, add to creamed mixture. Stir in 1/2 cups nuts.  
Grease Bundt pan (or tube pan) and coat inside with remaining nuts. Spoon 1/4 of batter in, sprinkle with filling, then top with remaining batter. Swirl with knife. Bake at 325° for 65-70 mins. Cool, remove from pan, wrap in plastic and foil to improve flavour. Store in fridge.
