CVCA rejects firm's expansion

MILTON - An Acton businessman's expansion plans have been scuttled by the Halton Region Conservation Authority. The authority has decided not to grant a fill permit Jack Ridley needs to expand the parking lot of his trucking business of Highway 25, south of Acton.

The town's land division committee granted a severance of 1.6 acres directly behind Mr. Ridley's existing home and business, provided he obtains the required fill permit from the authority and a development permit from the Niagara Escarpment Commission.

Town council approved the committee recommendation, provided approval was also obtained from the commission and authority.

The HRCA's executive committee rejected the permit application earlier this summer because staff feared the cumulative effect of development on the fringes of the Acton Swamp.

Stewart Hills, a University of Guelph land use planning professor, told the executive committee the development was not likely to have a measurable impact on the region's watershed.

Mr. Hills agreed with the concerns of HRCA staff about the cumulative effects of the fill, but said requiring Mr. Ridley to agree not to fill beyond a certain point would handle the possible problems, as long as the same criteria were applied to other surrounding landowners.

"Clearly in the case of the Acton Swamp, the impacts of the quarry to the east overwhelm by far any impact which the Ridley site may cause," the report said.

"In this case we have a land use which is clearly important to the local economy which is being restricted in a minor expansion because of regulations imposed long after the operation located here," it added.

The report said support should be built among neighbors of the swamp for a co-ordinated strategy to protect the swamp, adding granting the permit in return for a permanent restriction on filling in the east half of the new lot could be a positive step in that direction.

Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller, vice-chairman of the committee, said the authority's stand is a "real imposition" on a businessman because Mr. Ridley will now have to relocate his firm if he wants to expand.

"This is a miniscule intrusion into such a big swamp," he said. "We were appointed to make good, sound decisions, not to hurt people or the environment."

Mr. Ridley said he would not appeal the decision, but Mayor Miller slammed out of the meeting muttering.

Later the mayor said he has been a member of the authority for nine years and sees this as just another example of Burlington using its superior numbers to the detriment of the north.
