Rebels upset 1-0 in field hockey contest

The field hockey season has come to a disappointing end for the Georgetown District High School team. The Rebels, sporting an undefeated 5-0 record through the regular season, were upset 1-0 Wednesday afternoon by Lord Elgin in the first round of the playoffs. The game was played at the Georgetown field. The Rebels dominated play, especially in the second half when Lord

Elgin's only penetration into Georgetown territory resulted in their goal. Georgetown had four superb scoring chances, but couldn't capitalize. By virtue of their top finish in the East division this year the Rebels crossed over to the West and played the fourth place squad in the first round. Lord Elgin had a record of one win, two losses and three ties during the regular season.

"It was a big win," said Lord Elgin coach Liz Ferrer. "We came down here to give it the best we could, go for broke and whatever happened happened."

Marissa Shipton had the winning goal, but late in the game it was goaltender Sheila Bruce who made two fine saves to keep Lord Elgin on top.

"The strong point of this team is that it is a whole team with everyone rooting for one another," Ferrer said.

"I am pleasantly surprised, but we knew if we worked hard we would have a chance to win. Some of the games we've tied this year the girls were in a position to win and today the team got a win it was deserving to have," Ferrer said.

Georgetown coaches Paul Wren and Bill Smith said the loss was a disappointing one.

"The girls had several good opportunities, but couldn't capitalize," Smith said. "We played them (Lord Elgin) in an exhibition tournament this year and today they weren't the same team. This game they were more aggressive and were stopping the ball a lot better."

Wren said having faced little competition from East division foes during the regular season could have affected the Georgetown team.

"I think a problem we ran into during the regular season was that we didn't face much competition and ended up winning easily. We could have been a little overconfident."

"But the girls are to be commended. They did have a fine season," Smith added.

Blue Fins at first swim meet

Twelve members of the Halton Hills Blue Fins Swim Club competed Saturday in Richmond Hill. It was the Aquatic Club's 12th annual meet, with seven teams taking part, including those from Port Elgin, East York, Midland, Lakeshore and Port Hope.

As well, 4th place ribbons were won by Jenny Williams, 13, in the 200 m backstroke, Glen Oomen in the 50 m backstroke, Dawn Newman 100 m backstroke, and Janine Glaser 200 m IM.

5th place ribbon winners were Glen Oomen, 50 m freestyle, Dawn Newman 200 m IM, and Jenny Williams 100 m backstroke.
