



### Runner's notebook

A warm, sunny morning greeted runners at the starting line of the 16th running of the New York City Marathon. The race has grown from 174 runners to a field of over 18,000.

Two interesting innovations were used by ABC in their telecast Sunday. Bill Rodgers, who first won New York in 1976, wore a cardiogram hook-up to monitor his heart rate throughout the race. Rod Dixon, the '83 champ, wore a custom-made hockey helmet fitted with a video camera. He would run with the leaders at several points throughout to give viewers a bird's eye view of running with the beat in a marathon.

As in Chicago last week one of the favorites would be from the small country of Djibouti. Ahmed Saleh, who won the world championship marathon last year, was there. Geoff Smith, who led the '83 race until Dixon passed him 150 yards from the finish, was out to prove finishing first is much more fun than second.

On the women's side the New York City Marathon is Grete Waitz. The city and competitors love her and she loves the event. Although she has possibly slipped from the upper echelon of women's marathoning this year, she seems to rise to the occasion in New York. Lisa Martin, the '85 Pittsburgh Marathon champ, would be there to challenge Waitz.

The race went off quickly and was reminiscent of the Chicago race. Saleh, Smith and Bill Reifsnayder (a 61 minutes half marathoner) covered the second mile of the race in 4:12. They were sprinting away from the field. Slowly Smith began to pull away and by 10 miles was well ahead covering that distance in 47:37 - 4:40 per mile pace.

The women didn't go out with the same blistering pace yet Waitz and Martin gradually pulled away. At 11 miles however Waitz managed to pull away from Martin despite having stomach cramps. Jacqueline Gareau of Canada was third.

By the 16 mile point Saleh had passed Smith and was moving away. He seemed to rally as temperatures approached 80 degrees F. Meanwhile honorary New Yorker Grete Waitz was pulling away from Martin.

At 18 miles as Saleh approached Spanish Harlem, Smith seemed to be remembering his second place of 1983 and slowly closed the gap to 48 seconds. People were asking if he would be able to catch the leader at the finish as he himself had been caught two years before. Orlando Pizzolato, last year's champ, suddenly became a factor. Pizzolato, who had been in 12th at the half, moved to second at 20 miles. Most surprisingly had to be 37-year-old Bill Rodgers moving into fifth.

Pizzolato was gaining 15 seconds per mile on Saleh and at 22 miles was only 50 seconds behind the leader. As the camera panned the two leaders, viewers could see third runner Pat Peterson and Rodgers still closing. This race was going to end as a one mile sprint finish.

Pizzolato caught Saleh at 23 miles and they ran together for the next two. Then Pizzolato made his move and Saleh couldn't stay with him. The Italian won this race for the second time in 2:11:33, a very credible time in the heat. A dejected Saleh was second, Peterson third and Don Norman fourth.

Grete Waitz again showed her power as she won the women's race for the seventh time in 2:28:33. Martin was second, a minute behind.

The excitement again has shown this race is indeed the most exciting marathon in the world.

## Schools fare well in event

Both Georgetown District High School boys volleyball teams will host the Halton semi finals this coming Friday.

The junior and senior teams easily advanced to the second round with playoff wins Monday at the GDHS gym. The juniors disposed of Assumption 3-0 (15-4, 15-8 and 15-7) while the senior squad beat Lord Elgin 3-0 (15-5, 15-8 and 15-10).

Bob McKay's junior team started slowly, but once they started hitting the ball took immediate control of the match and set the tone for a Rebel sweep. Four net serves and three out-of-bounds serves didn't help the visitors' plight in the first game.

The same was true for the second game as the Rebels started to hit the ball well leading 10-7. After that, it wasn't much of a contest. In Game Three McKay had a chance to play most of second team players.

"We set the tone early, and once you can do that it is tough for a team to rebound," McKay said. "I also thought we set the ball well. It makes it easier for our hitters if we get the type of sets we were getting tonight."

"I was surprised they weren't a little stronger," McKay added. "In talking with their coaches before they felt they had a legitimate shot at it."

Georgetown will face either Nelson High School or Aldershot Friday, and McKay feels the latter will be his next opponent. "We've seen them at a tournament and they're every bit as good as we are," he said.

In the senior contest the Rebels too set the tone early with deft offensive kills and good defensive blocks.

"I am pleased," said co-coach Russ Linney. "We pretty much stayed with our game plan. I thought we also got some good back court digging."

Linney said captain Jon Hammer played well, adding Hammer led the way with 10 kills in the match. In a situation where it was obvious their opposition wasn't up to par, the Rebels could have laid back and played

uninspired ball. But Linney said that didn't happen. "That's why I was happy with the consistency we did show," he said.

#### Raider in Flint

Former Georgetown Chrysler Raider defenceman Fred Boimistruk arrived in Flint Wednesday, and played in his first International Hockey League game of the year Friday night. Any hopes of having him return to Georgetown could be called slim.

"He worked out with us for a week, and will be moving in for the winter," said Flint general manager Doug McKay. "He'll be here for the year."

Boimistruk will be the only Flint player to have spent time in the National Hockey League as McKay said his club is going with young players with no professional experience.

#### Jim doing well

Jim Egerton is working out well with Flint too McKay said. In three games Egerton has a goal and two assists.

Egerton had four goals in his first game as a Raider in an 8-7 loss to Dundas.

McKay, who had Egerton in Muskegon of the International league, also said he expects Egerton to be in Flint for a while.

"He's had a lot of opportunities here and is just missing the net. Even the pro players here (in league) are asking who he is after he shoots. If he gets his shot on goal, he can handcuff anyone."
