

Rebel hoop squads rolling right along

Both Georgetown District High School girls basketball teams came up with wins Thursday, but in two different fashions.

The juniors easily defeated Oakville-Trafalgar 58-20 while the senior squad was involved in a much more tighter contest. But the senior Rebels came away with a 33-29 win.

Both games were played at the Georgetown gym.

The junior Rebels jumped out to a 25-0 lead after the first quarter and never looked back. It was the type of game coach Moe Leeking wanted for his troops after their week-long layoff.

"It was up tempo, and everyone got into the game," Leeking said. "In terms of passing, I'd say it was probably our best game of the year."

Shanna Long led the way offensively for Georgetown, netting 18 points. Tara Burroughs had 14 points.

The win lifted the junior Rebels to a 6-1 record this season with six games left to play. Georgetown is in a first-place tie with Acton Redmen, who were idle last week and have a 6-0 record.

"The way we passed we were very unselfish," Leeking said. "Maybe a little too unselfish at times."

In the senior matchup Georgetown led throughout, but the visitors did make it close at times. Yet Oakville-Trafalgar couldn't come within a three point span anytime during the game.

It was abnormally warm in the Georgetown gym, which affected the Rebels fast break, coach Meredith Smye said after the game.

"It got so bad that one of our players (Chris Harris) had to come off now and then," Smye said.

Thursday's win was the fourth in a row for Georgetown after having

dropped their first two games of the year.

"It was a team effort," Smye said. "This team lost its first two games and since then has pulled it together."

"If we can maintain (this pace) we'll be okay. I'd rather start slow and be at this point this time in the season," Smye said.

Lori Book had nine points for Georgetown while Anne Powers added eight.

Hosts win consolation

Georgetown District High School's senior girls basketball team won the consolation title at the Georgetown Tip-Off tournament played this weekend at the GDHS gym.

Georgetown dropped its first game to Milton 20-18 after a double overtime. Suzanne Parker had five points for the Rebels.

The host team then rallied to defeat Cardinal Leger of Brampton 21-20 to gain a berth in the consolation final. Lisa Mason had six points while Laura Young chipped in with five.

In the final, Georgetown beat Aldershot 31-23 as Mason and Young again were the top scorers, notching 10 and seven points respectively.

North Park won the event, defeating Milton 17-9 in the championship.

Redmen tourney

An apprehensive Acton team dropped a 23-22 decision to M.M. Robinson Saturday in the final of the Acton Redmen junior girls basketball tournament.

The host squad seemed uninspired and unable to click in the final. The best example of the Acton squad's trouble came in the first half when with an apparent clear drive to the hoop, guard Sue Craig pulled up at the key and turned the ball over on a five second call.

"We had no momentum, no flow at all," said co-coach Lyn McLaren. "I don't have the answer why."

However, Acton held a 20-19 lead with less than two minutes left to play. The Robinson crew took the lead with 1:50 left, then were able to control the ball and run the clock down to 36 seconds before the Redmen fouled and put Robinson on the foul line. They missed, but recovered the rebound and finally scored the insurance hoop with 21 seconds left for a 23-20 lead. Craig scored for Acton with two seconds left to close the gap, but Robinson didn't have to inbound the ball for the win.

"When they took the lead we were in a zone and the baseline away player played man and the kid (M.M. player) went by," McLaren said. "When you play zone you play an area."

"It was a bad time to come up with a bad one," McLaren said.

Acton made it to the final by defeating Cawthra Park 29-18 and T.A. Blake 34-24.

On the consolation side, Georgetown District High School won the title, defeating Cawthra Park in the final 36-13. The Rebels lost 39-14 to Streetsville, then rebounded for a 49-15 win over Collingwood.

Rebel coach Moe Leeking said bad shooting was the main reason why Georgetown lost its initial contest.

"For every shot they had we had four," he said. "We didn't shoot well. Credit their defence though and they made two clutch free throws twice after we intentionally fouled them."

Leeking also said his opponents had different players which weren't present the time when Leeking saw them at a tournament. As a result Leeking said he may have psyched his club up too much into thinking the game wouldn't be a very difficult one.

In the consolation final Georgetown led 15-8 early, but blew the game wide open with a defensive move.

"We went into a half court zone, and they couldn't adjust and we took control from then on," he said.

ACTON-Acton Junior "C" Sabres got their first taste of victory this week.

Acton jumped out to a 7-1 first period lead, then had to put on a little burst at the end to defeat Grand Valley 13-10 in Grand Valley Sunday night. Wednesday night the Sabres dropped a 10-8 decision to Keswick at the Acton Arena.

To date Acton's record is one win against five losses.

Sabres' coach Steve Marshall said the win was nice, but added he wasn't

pleased with how his club netted the victory.

"It was nice, but the boys were happier Wednesday night after the loss because it was a good effort. We played a good first period, outshot them and had the 7-1 lead.
