It is with deep regret that we place on record the death of one of our esteemed members William (Bill) Wylie. He will be sadly missed by his family and all his friends.

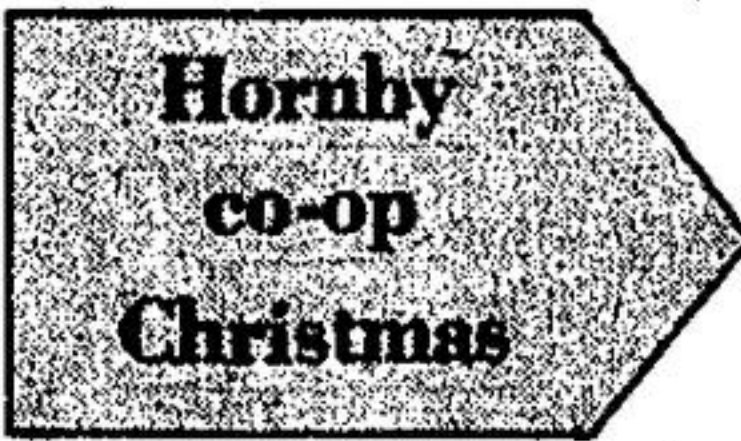
