

# Lancers slash football Rebels

An inability to cash in on early chances prevented Georgetown District High School football Rebels from finishing the regular season with a winning record.

The Rebels were defeated 21-0 Wednesday afternoon by Burlington

Central High School at the Georgetown field. The game left Georgetown with a two wins, three losses mark this season in East Halton tier II junior boys football league play.

But the Rebels will still make the playoffs. The top eight ranked teams

qualify for post-season play, and the Rebels were ranked sixth. Georgetown will face third place Milton in the first round of the playoffs Wednesday in Milton.

Wednesday Georgetown dominated play in the first half, but Burlington

led 8-0 on a 50-yard double reverse major by Mike Steed late in the second quarter. Burlington got the convert in odd fashion as the snap from centre was fumbled. Kicker Joe Korman picked up the ball, then ran it in for the two pointer.

Earlier in the quarter the Rebels had the ball the Burlington 21, but turned it over on a Tim Racinsky fumble. On the next series Georgetown took possession at the Burlington 15 when Brett Serjeantson intercepted a pass, and ran it back 20 yards. But the offence couldn't move the ball and a 20-yard field goal was wide.

The key to the Burlington win was Cam Brit's one yard touchdown (the convert was no good) capped off an 30-yard drive which consumed almost the entire quarter. The Rebels only got the ball once early, and had to punt it away.

A blocked punt in the final quarter set up Brit's second touchdown, a 17-yard run. The convert was good. Georgetown showed signs of moving the ball for an apparent major, but that was snuffed out late when Burlington intercepted the pass.

"They didn't do anything special," said Georgetown coach Rick Redshaw. "Our guys just weren't picking up their man."

Redshaw said being down in the first half despite dominating play didn't discourage his team.

"To me this team says it is only on play, only one touchdown and we can get it back. I think the two-point convert hurt more than anything."

Redshaw won't let his troops forget about this game either in Georgetown's preparation for the playoffs this week.

"We will dwell on it. We weren't thinking. Our tackling was good but the mental part of our game was wrong. We want to know what happened," he said.

NOTES — Burlington did a good job of stopping running back Tim Racinsky. The Rebel runner was held to 14 yards on seven carries. He carried the ball once in the second half. Gramada completed four of 12 and backup Brent Falcone was 0 for 1.

## Athletic scholarship eases education burden

The indecision of where to go for a university education is something Joanne Bingham won't have to worry about now.

The 18-year-old, Grade 13 Georgetown District High School student will be attending Western Michigan University this fall on a full athletic scholarship for her prowess on the volleyball court.

"The coach there saw me last year playing club volleyball at the junior provincials," Bingham said. "A couple of weeks ago he was in Toronto and dropped by and talked about the school and programs available."

Bingham also visited the campus in Kalamazoo, Michigan and really liked what she saw there.

"It's a real volleyball town," she said. "They get about 3,000 people out to the games, and volleyball there is the number one sport."

Two other American schools were also interested in the six-foot, one-inch Bingham. However she had special

reasons for selecting Western Michigan. "It's a good volleyball school and the academic programs are good, too," she said. "But it's also fairly close (a six hour drive from Georgetown). This way my parents can come down and it won't cost as much to get me home for Christmas."

Bingham said having the scholarship renewed every year does put pressure on her to improve or at least maintain the level she is currently at. However, she doesn't feel that will hinder her at all.

"I'm fairly confident I'll be able to maintain it (scholarship)," she said.

Bingham is also confident she will see a lot of court time next season too.

"One of the things the coach said to

me is that he doesn't recruit players to sit on the bench," she said.

Western Michigan is a Division A-A school that plays in the Mid-American Conference, and also tolls with teams from the Big-10 conference. This season the school is ranked 11th in American college ladies volleyball polls.

Bingham said she is glad she knows what her future plans are for a university education, and added she might take physical education or communications at the American school.

"I know I'll be going somewhere (and in that respect) the pressure is off," she said.

Obtaining the scholarship means all of Bingham's educational expenses will be taken care of by the school. Over a four year time period that could amount to around \$45,000, Bingham said. However the scholarship will be renewed on a yearly basis.

Bingham, who this summer played for the Canadian junior ladies team despite only having a year of club ball experience, said she would still like to play for the national senior team in the future. She also said her dream to play in the Olympics is still alive.

"It will have to be in 1992 though," she said. "I'll still be going to school in 1988."

For the remainder of this year however Bingham will continue playing club ball in Scarborough and will also suit up for the Georgetown District High School senior girls team.

## Rebel hoop teams have differing weeks

Georgetown District High School junior girls basketball team won a pair of gritty contests this week.

The Rebels defeated T.A. Blake-lock Tuesday there in what coach Moe Leeking said was "the most deceiving score of our season". Georgetown won 41-20, but needed a streak in the final quarter to record the seemingly one-sided win.

"It was a tough, grinding game in which we had a couple streaks of three or four baskets. Otherwise both teams were lethargic on offence and in press breaking."

The Rebel defence was the real story as Blake-lock scored 12 of its points from the foul line.

Thursday Georgetown hosted Milton, and came away with a 40-33 win. Jenny Melville had 11 points while Tara Burroughs added 10 and Marye Boks had eight.

"They had a lot of trouble with our man press, and weren't handling the ball well," Leeking said. "They called a time out, developed a press breaker, scored some quick hoops and got their confidence back. Whenever they had a chance to set up their offense they shot well."

The wins give Georgetown an eight

wins-one loss record for second spot in the East Halton North Division behind Acton Redmen. The Rebels play away twice this week as Tuesday they travelled to Perdue, and will be on the road Thursday to play E.C. Drury.

For the senior squad it was a rough week as the Rebels dropped a pair of games to even their record at 4-4. Tuesday Georgetown dropped a 49-39 decision to T.A. Blake-lock and Thursday the Rebels lost a 33-11 contest to Milton.

Coaches Meredith Syme and Toni Spina felt their squad could win their Blake-lock contest based on what they saw at the Rebel tournament. However it wasn't meant to be.

Chris Harris had 12 points for the Rebels while Jodi Barwell chipped in with six.

Thursday Georgetown fell behind early and could never overcome the deficit. Both coaches felt their squad was indeed flat.

"This week has been upsetting, but we're not out of it by any means," Syme added. "We're hoping it's just a low point and we go right back up."

The Rebels will travel to E.C. Drury Thursday in their only game of the week.

ACTON — On a night reserved for ghosts and goblins, it only seemed appropriate Boo Tufford would lead the Acton senior girls basketball team to a win on Hallowe'en Thursday.

Tufford has 19 points, 15 in the second half as the Redmen defeated Queen Elizabeth Park 35-24 at the Acton gym. The seniors also defeated Loyola 51-18 Tuesday and have a record of five wins and three losses in East Halton North Division play.

Thursday the Redmen only had a 14-13 advantage over the Eagles, who had a distinct height advantages. But with Tufford hitting from the perimeter and solid rebounding on the defensive boards Acton took control in the second half.

"We tried a 1-1-3 defense which was totally different. We normally play a 2-1-2 zone or man defence and the starters adjusted well to it," Andrews said.

The Redmen lead the North division with a 9-0 record, and played Milton Tuesday. Thursday they host Perdue at the Acton gym.
