APPOINTMENTS TO VARIOUS BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills will be considering appointments to the Boards and Committees outlined below. Applications together with a short resume will be received until November 29, 1985. If you are interested in applying for membership in more than one Committee, please list those you are interested in applying for in order of priority. Please note that a Committee of Council will be interviewing the applicants for the Committees.

HALTON HILLS PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD

Five (5) members are needed to serve until December, 1988. Applicants must be 18 years of age, Canadian Citizens, residents of Halton Hills and not municipal or library board employees. Board members should be prepared to attend regular monthly meetings, plus special meetings and set policy which provides for the management, regulation and control of the library.

COMMITTEE OF ADJUSTMENT

Applications for citizens to serve on the Committee of Adjustment until December, 1988. This Committee meets on a monthly basis to consider Applications for Minor Variances to the Town Zoning By-Laws enacted under the Planning

ACTIVAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE Two (2) members are needed to serve until December, 1988. The applicants must be residents of the Town of Halton Hills. This committee meets 3 or 4

times a year and discusses policy for the Town's ActiVan service. PROPERTY STANDARDS COMMITTEE

Two (2) members are needed to serve, one until December, 1987 and the other until December, 1988. The Committee meets to hear appeals of property owners from Orders to Comply from Property Standards Officers. Applicants should be residents who are not employees of the Town or of a local Town

Board. . HALTON SAFETY COUNCIL Two (2) members who are residents of Halton Hills are needed to sit on this

Region-wide Committee until December, 1986. The Council deals with Traffic. Water and Family Safety at monthly meetings.

LAND DIVISION COMMITTEE

Two (2) members, who are residents of Halton Hills, are needed to sit on this Regional Committee until December, 1988. The Committee consists of eight (8) members, two from each local municipality in the Region.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Two (2) members are needed to serve on this Committee until December. 1988. At least one of the members must be from the Georgetown Urban Area. The Committee meets approximately once or twice a month.
