

Raiders rock solid with new affiliate

Georgetown Chrysler Raiders have taken a step towards keeping themselves rock solid in times of player shortages.

The Ontario Senior "A" hockey team has affiliated with Elora Rocks of the Ontario Intermediate "C" hockey circuit. Raiders president Finn Poustrup and vice-president of hockey operations Barry Whitworth met with Elora executive members last week and put the finishing touches on the affiliation.

What the affiliation does is safeguard against the type of shortage which cost the Raiders dearly in the playoffs last year. Against Petrolia in

the quarterfinals the Raiders had a 3-2 lead in games and a 3-0 lead going into the third period of Game Six before succumbing to Petrolia in the series 4-3. A major reason why was the team only had two regular defencemen and had to use forwards to supplement their blueline staff.

Now, should that happen, Elora players can be brought in to fill the gap. Also, the Raiders received two extra cards from the Intermediate "C" club which won't be affected by their cutdown dates. By Feb. 10 the Raiders will have to be down to 19 players and two goalies, but will have the two extra cards not included in the cutdown.

Both Poustrup and Whitworth said any players brought up from Elora would only be done so with the club's permission.

"If they couldn't afford it, then in my opinion we would have to abide by their decision," Whitworth said. "We wouldn't want to jeopardize their position in their league."

For their part, the Raiders would supply players to Elora who have Senior potential, but need some seasoning. Also, the Senior club could play their affiliate in an exhibition game with all the proceeds going to Elora.

The new affiliation comes after the Raiders unsuccessfully tried to affiliate with Hillsburgh Royals, also of the Intermediate "C" league. However, that never came about as the Royals' executive decided against it.

"I was very disappointed we couldn't work something out with Hillsburgh," Poustrup said. "They seemed like a natural to me. We know their team and they're closer."

Both Poustrup and Whitworth said they will be careful not to use any Elora player more than three times after Dec. 1. After that time the player would belong to the Raiders and be unable to re-join Elora. Last year the Rocks won the Intermediate "C" league title.

"It seems like a good affiliation. They're decent people and I think it will work nicely," Whitworth said. "I think this could be a long-term affiliation."

As to what the two cards will be used for, Whitworth said that's something that will be crucial for his hockey club.

"Those cards are very important," he said. "We could have monumental discussions on this subject. For now they are both locked away."
