# Grid Rebels qualify for final

## Eastwood squashes rivals

Two Georgetown Racquet Club members travelled to Sarnia to compete in the three day South Western Ontario Junior Open event.

Stephen Eastwood won the boys under 16 title, defeating his opponent 9-0, 9-0, 9-3 in the championship finals. Lloyd Newman playing in the under-19 division was put out by the number one seed and finished in sixth place.

After having been shut out the past two weeks, the Georgetown District High School junior boys football team showed a Rea of hope of coming back last week.

The Rebels suffered a 21-0 loss in their regular season finale against Burlington-Central, then dropped a 27-0 decision in their playoff contest with Milton. But the Georgetown offence got two touchdowns from receiver Don Rea (two more were called back) in a 14-7 win over Perdue Panthers Wednesday. The win put the

Rebels' record at 3-4 so far this year and gives the Georgetown team a berth in the Tier II consolation championship against none other than Burlington-Central again in Burlington today.

"Burlington-Central is my old

school, so there will be some extra incentive," said Rebel coach Rick Redshaw. "But I've talked it over with their coach and we've decided we will play everyone in this game, even if it means losing the game because we

want to give some kids a look for next year."

Wednesday the Rebels scored their majors on their first two possessions. Rea's first major was on a 35-yard end around while his second came on a

36-yard reverse. Dave Varricchio had both converts.

Georgetown was without running back Tim Racinsky, who was on a class field trip. His spot was aptly taken by defensive back Brett Serjeantson, who had 85 yards on 12 carries. Brother Kirk played fullback, and provided some fine lead blocks in the game too.

"We knew Brett could run," Redshaw said. "But to find the holes like he did was surprising."

The Rebels also added a new wrinkle that could rival Chicago Bears' use of William Perry in the backfield. The Georgetown team used a tackle sweep where offensive lineman Brian Hayward carried the ball. He did so twice in the game for about four yards a crack.

Georgetown also used the game to get backup quarterback Brett Falcone some playing time. He took over from starter Rob Gramada in the second half.

"We would call the play, but he would call the hole," Redshaw said. "He did pretty well."

Despite fog, Flamboro flew into town and caught our boys on the fly with a 5-3 victory over the black and red. Georgetown put the first marker on the board when Scott McGulgan popped one in past Flamboro's goalie with the help of linemate Greg Dobbin. Unfortunately, Flamboro came back with 5 quick second period points and Georgetown was put in the catch up position once again. Ryan Peils and Andy Elliott got past the opposition's goalie with assists from Elliott and defenceman Jeff Pettigrew but victory was not to be Georgetown's Tuesday night. The team is now trying to get in lots of practice for their upcoming tournament in Orillia over the Christmas holidays as competition should prove to be of good quality.

## Petrie off to good start as Jr. Sabre

With over a year's experience with Vaughn Raiders of the Central Ontario Junior B Hockey League under his belt, Wally Petrie looked to a bright future. But the 19 year old quit the team and returned to Acton where he now plays Junior C.

"There was too much travelling in Junior B. They didn't have a bus," said Petrie. "They wanted us there an hour and a half before game time."

Vaughn has two practices and two games per week and Acton has one practice and one game per week, which leaves Petrie with more spare time.

Financial stress also contributed to Petrie's decision to play for Acton. With less travelling and playing time, he can now work full time and still play hockey.

Petrie is off to a good start this year with 41 points in 10 games. Petrie's excellent start demonstrates he has been able to adjust to Junior C hockey quickly.

"The players are adjusting to me. Junior B was faster and the play was a little sharper, but the hits are just as hard," he said.

Petrie's speed gives him an advantage in Junior C. One that he needs, because other teams realize his talent.

"We played in Bradford on Sunday and there were a couple of cheap shots," he said.

Officiating is one major adjustment that Petrie has had to make.

"The penalties are unreal against Acton," he said. "You get frustrated. You just don't retaliate."

"The refs might not like Acton, because one guy was suspended for seven games for spearing a ref," he added.

Petrie pointed out the referees are on probation until Christmas so they call anything that looks like a penalty.

Acton's record of 3 wins and 11 losses has not bothered Petrie.

"They are coming, for a team that is starting from scratch. Another month or so and we'll be in there competing," he said.

His decision to quit Junior B and play for Acton by no means implies that Petrie is not looking for a future with hockey.

He is hoping for a scholarship somewhere in the United States.

"That's where I think it's at, nowadays. Plus you have something to fall back on," Petrie said.

Last year Petrie spent two days with the North Bay Centennials of the Ontario Hockey League, but decided to return in order to remain eligible for a scholarship. Rules stipulate if a player spends more than 48 hours with a Major Junior team, he is no longer available for a scholarship.

"A lot of players screw up their scholarship by staying too long," Petrie said.

Should the 5'9" 165 lb. forward receive a scholarship he would go for a degree in Physical Education and Business. But he added that he still might go back to Junior B as he is eligible to play for one more year.

Petrie won the rookie of the year last year in the Central League when he was with Vaughn.

"I was surprised, there were a lot of good players in that league," he said.

Petrie feels that once the players in Acton get to know each other they will become a solid team.

"But we need the fans, the team is losing money," he said.
