

High school girls basketball roundup

Junior Rebels qualify for Halton finals

Any thoughts of overconfidence felt by the Georgetown District High School junior girls basketball team have been quickly put to rest.

The Rebels defeated a pesky Assumption squad 42-28 Friday to advance to the Halton final (played Tuesday) against Nelson High School. The final contest was played at the Georgetown gym, as was the semi final game.

Assumption came into the semi final after defeating previously unbeaten M.M. Robinson in the South Division playoff. For a time late in the final quarter, it almost looked like the underdog squad would add Georgetown to its list of credits.

The home team led 13-4 at the half, mostly on the strength of a seven-for-eight performance from the foul line. The Rebels didn't shoot well, and weren't taking advantage of the many

opportunities being granted to them.

Assumption began shooting well in the third frame, and although the visitors were trailing 29-18 going into the fourth quarter they showed signs of coming on.

Assumption cut the advantage down to 29-24 with just over four minutes left to play. It wasn't until Cindy Murnaghan and Allison Irvine began cashing in on fast break chances that the Rebels gave themselves a little breathing room and went on to win.

Irvine finished the game with 14 points while Tara Burroughs had 10 points and Jenny Melville chipped in with eight.

"That's what makes this game so unpredictable," said Rebels' coach Moe Leeking. "They started to shoot better and we got a case of lazy feet."

"They didn't beat M.M. Robinson without doing something. They showed a lot of character in coming back," he said.

The Rebels finished the day with 10 free throws in 12 attempts, which Leeking said wasn't by accident.

"All year I've been fighting them (players) to do it (foul shooting) the right way. They all had different styles."

"I told them we would shoot 25 foul

shots a day so when we went to the line in a game the situation would be the same," he said.

Earlier in the week Acton Redmen were defeated by T.A. Blakelock 34-33, and Leeking was concerned his troops would feel they had a cake-walk to the championship. Even at the half Friday

Leeking was somewhat worried.

"I could see at halftime they were getting a little too contented for me. We'll have to work on our press breaking, because we seemed to get a little rattled," he said.

For their part the Rebels did well with their pressure defence as through-

out Georgetown forced turnovers, and had opportunity after opportunity, but the shots wouldn't drop.

Georgetown advanced to Friday's semi final with a 43-37 win over White Oaks Wednesday in Georgetown. Burroughs had 12 points while Melville had 11 and Irvine added 10.

Acton eliminated by Blakelock team

OAKVILLE-For the first time in two years, the junior girls basketball championships won't find its way to Acton High School.

The two-time defending Acton Redmen dropped out of contention with a heart-breaking 34-33 loss at the hands of T.A. Blakelock. The quarterfinal contest was played here Wednesday.

The home team led 19-15 at the half, but Acton assumed 27-26 advantage heading into the final quarter. The two teams were neck-and-neck even heading into the final six seconds when Acton inbounded the ball in Blakelock territory. However, the Redmen couldn't find Susan Craig for the go-ahead hoop, and the home side took the win.

"We just couldn't make it work," said Acton co-coach Anne Andrews. "But it wasn't due to a lack of trying."

Craig led the offensive charge for the Redmen with 13 points, despite being double and sometimes triple teamed. Melissa Courson had six points and Margie Parker added five.

Acton's other coach Lyn McLaren felt although his team was unable to inbound the ball to Craig in the dying seconds, he couldn't get too upset.

"There was no reason why we should have been in that situation," he said. "We turned the ball over to them 2-1 and still only lost by a

point."

Something that really hurt the Redmen occurred in the third quarter when point guard Margie Parker fouled out of the game. That left Acton without a proven ball handler to operate the offence.

"They were doing a good job on Sue, and I was hoping Margie could go inside and under so I could see what they would do," McLaren said.

Wednesday's game was the second in two days for the Redmen, which might have been a factor, Andrews said.

"You go from a game where you're relaxed (48-27 preliminary round playoff win), to a cracker jack game like this," she said.

Both coaches said the loss was a disappointing one, and didn't dismiss the affect that their 30-19 season finale and only loss of the year to Georgetown might have had.

"That game proved to us that we had a lot of work to do," Andrews said. "We came back and worked on the things we weren't happy with."

"Subconsciously it might have been part of it," McLaren said. "But I could see this coming. We couldn't get the intensity out of the players in practice and they didn't have the same spark they had this time last year."

Craig and Parker both had 12 points in the win over Loyola.

OT gains revenge on Senior Rebels

OAKVILLE-The last time Georgetown and Oakville-Trafalgar met in a senior girls basketball game, the Rebels were able to control the game's pace and come away with a four-point win.

However, Tuesday it was the

hometown Devils who controlled the pace and recorded a 53-36 preliminary round playoff game. The loss eliminated Georgetown from further post-season action.

The Devils had centre Kirsten Campbell dressed Tuesday, and she

responded with 15 points. As well as her offensive scoring prowess, Campbell was able to effectively pass off to the open player when she was covered.

When the two teams met earlier in the regular season, Campbell wasn't dressed. As a result, the Rebels were

able to control both the offensive and defensive boards in that game, something they had difficulty with in Tuesday's matchup.

Also, the Devils got their fast break in order early, and scored at least 20 points off it throughout the game. When the Rebels were able to get back on defence, they did a fairly decent job against the Devils.

Yet despite being all but out of the game in the final quarter, the Rebels played inspired ball and refused to quit. The Georgetown team's effort pleased coaches Meredith Smye and Toni Spina.

"We weren't expecting them to be that good offensively," Smye said after the game. "Especially on the fast break."

"There have been times this year when we've given up, but we didn't in the second half, and I was happy with that," Smye added.

"If we didn't do one thing it was sustaining our press," Smye said. "But I couldn't have asked the girls to do any more than they did."

Chris Harris had 10 points for the Rebels while Jodi Barwell chipped in with eight. Lori Book finished the game with seven.

The nucleus of the Rebels' squad will be back next season as the team loses only Barwell. With the influx of members of the Rebels' junior squad, Smye and Spina are optimistic for next season.

BIG fourth quarter gives Blakelock playoff hoop victory

OAKVILLE-For three quarters it seemed Acton High School's senior girls basketball team would avenge its regular season loss to T.A. Blakelock when it counted most - in the playoffs.

But a 29-point final quarter left the Redmen on the losing end of a 43-38 decision Wednesday. The contest was a quarter-final game played here. Acton qualified for the quarter-final with a 48-27 win over Queen Elizabeth last Tuesday.

Acton led the entire way through the first three quarters. Even without junior player Susan Craig, the Acton squad was able to stay on top.

However, pinpoint shooting from both the field and foul line paced the Blakelock squad for its comeback win. In the final quarter when Acton would foul Blakelock players, the home side responded with six free throws.

"Their outside shooting was very good and they moved the ball up court well," said Acton co-coach Anne Andrews. "Our kids were looking for

an opening in their zone defence, but it wasn't there."

Boo Tufford led the way offensively for the Redmen with 15 points, 11 of which came in the final quarter. Judy Thomson had 10 points while Lee Ann Johnson chipped in with six.

Acton used Craig for the first half, but found out they legally couldn't. Both Andrews and McLaren thought Craig was eligible for senior play because she had played in one prior game during the regular season.

But in the playoffs, a junior can only play senior if she commits herself to senior competition. Craig had played in the junior team's playoff, also at Blakelock, the game before the senior contest.

The Blakelock coach said if his team was going to win the game, it would do so on the court and not by way of a protest. It was decided the contest would go on, and Craig would not play in the second half.

Although she only had two points in the first two quarters, Craig was responsible for nine Blakelock turnovers.

"It was a game we shouldn't have lost," Acton co-coach Lyn McLaren said. "Their shooting was marvellous to the point where we had to consider using a man defence. But because we were in foul trouble we couldn't. Give them credit: the best team of the day went on."

While the loss eliminated Acton from Halton play, the squad still has another tournament to attend. The Redmen will take part in the OFSAA "A" tournament Dec. 5-7 in Base Borden in Barrie.

"We'll try to do as well as we can, but I'd like to use everyone," McLaren said. "We're hoping this will be a nice windup to the year."

"I am pleased with the senior team this year. They did exceedingly well for the talent we had," McLaren added.

In the preliminary win over Q.E. Park, Tufford had 14 points while Thomson added 13 and Johnson chipped in with eight.

Capricorns net victory

With five players in double figures, Capricorns scored a big hoop win in Georgetown Ladies Basketball League play Wednesday.
