To begin the season of Advent, over 160 parishioners at St. George's Anglican Church gathered at 8 a.m. on Dec. 1 for a service of Holy Communion, followed by a parish breakfast. The meal was prepared by the Men's Club under the direction of Lew Stevenson.

Father Newsham, with a cheerfulness and commitment spoke of his work with fellow sufferers at the hospital. Although he has the use of only a few fingers on one hand, he manages to drive himself around in his electric wheelchair and works a full schedule at the hospital, where he lives






The employment of lay professional ministers in the Anglican Church has not been common in recent years, although there has been a rich history of such involvement in past decades.




Rev. Jim Boyles (middle) releames his two new pastoral assist-
